

# **Section III: Detention**





# **Introduction to Detention**

DJS operates five detention facilities across the State, since closing Alfred D. Noyes Children's Center in October 2022, to provide temporary and secure custody of youth subject to court jurisdiction. Youth may be detained at various points in the juvenile justice system. The juvenile court may order detention for youth pending a court hearing (pre- or post-disposition), pending initial placement in a treatment program, or pending placement in a treatment program post-removal. Youth are commonly detained for new complaints alleging delinquent behavior, writs and warrants issued by the court, or violations of alternatives to detention (ATD) program conditions. Additionally, DJS intake officers have the authority to detain youth under certain conditions. Note that youth pending adult criminal charges may also be held in DJS detention facilities while the transfer of jurisdiction from adult to juvenile court is being considered (*see "Youth Charged as Adults Pending Transfer" on page 128-129*).

#### **DETENTION PROCESS**

The decision whether to detain a youth is primarily determined by the juvenile court. However, juvenile detention may be authorized by DJS intake officers on a temporary basis at the request of a law enforcement officer or community detention officer. DJS is empowered by statute to detain a youth who either poses a clear risk to themselves/others, or is deemed likely to fail to appear for the subsequent court hearing. The Detention Risk Assessment Instrument (DRAI- see Appendix C) guides this decision, which is subject to court review on the next court day. The DRAI objectively informs detention decisions by taking into account three factors:

(1) the assessed risk that a youth will reoffend or will fail to appear for a court hearing, based on known risk factors from the youth's history, including offenses adjudicated and pending adjudication;

(2) seriousness of the current alleged offense; and

(3) other factors that require DJS to temporarily detain a youth regardless of risk or offense seriousness, including an outstanding writ, warrant, or interstate hold.

By law, the DRAI must be validated every five years in order to ensure that the assessed risk factors remain both accurate and predictive. The DRAI is an essential tool for the Department and the court to ensure fair and evidence-based decision making regarding the use of secure detention.

#### **DETENTION ADMISSIONS**

Each detention facility operates an admissions area 24 hours a day where all youth admitted to detention are processed. An admissions officer interviews youth to collect and verify basic identifying information. The admissions officer also searches the DJS information system to obtain available information on a youth's delinquency and placement history. A photograph of each youth is taken and included in the case record for identification purposes. Each youth receives a facility handbook that includes information on facility procedures, the


behavior motivation program, services and programming, grievance procedures, and the Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA). Youth are issued clothing to wear in the facility. Personal clothing is cleaned, catalogued, packaged, and placed in secure storage.

The admissions process includes an initial health screening. A Registered Nurse conducts the admission health assessment, which consists of a review of physical health, mental health, and substance abuse needs. A licensed physician or nurse practitioner conducts a review of medical history and a physical examination within seven days of admission.

#### DETENTION CASE MANAGEMENT

Youth detained by the juvenile court are assigned a DJS community case manager and a facility case manager. The community case manager visits the youth in detention, interviews the youth and family, and completes required investigations and/or assessments, e.g., a Social History Investigation or MCASP Risk & Needs Assessment (see Appendix C). The facility case manager acts as a liaison with the court,

family, community case manager, and treatment service providers while the youth is in detention. The facility case manager also assists youth with understanding the facility handbooks and the behavior motivation program upon admission to the facility, and answers any questions the youth may have. They facilitate individual meetings, weekly groups, and activities. They monitor youth progress in the behavior motivation program and may provide information and input for the Multidisciplinary Assessment Staffing Team meetings.

# Services Provided in Detention Facilities

#### BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES


DJS Behavioral Health Services (BHS) establishes and implements policies concerning the delivery of mental health, substance use, and evidence-based treatment services to youth under DJS supervision. BHS licensed and certified staff counselors and contractors provide assessments and necessary services. BHS provides integrated mental health and substance use disorder screening, assessments, and shortterm crisis services in DJS detention facilities. For youth who are pending placement, BHS provides individual and family therapy in order to prepare youth to transition to a treatment program. This allows youth the opportunity to begin working on treatment goals and begin learning dialectical behavior therapy (DBT) skills.

Upon admission to a detention center, each youth is screened by trained staff for urgent behavioral health concerns. Within seven days of admission the youth is assessed by a qualified behavioral health professional. The screening consists of an interview, the administration of tests as appropriate, and the review of any prior assessments or records (e.g., psychosocial or clinical assessments). If the initial behavioral health screen reveals mental health concerns, more in-depth evaluations or additional services are recommended. These evaluations, conducted by psychiatrists, social workers or

licensed psychologists, examine the emotional, adaptive, and cognitive functioning of detained youth.

Additionally, counselors and other behavioral health staff screen and assess youth in detention and determine appropriate levels of substance use treatment. This information assists case managers in linking youth with appropriate community and residential services. Behavioral health staff work closely with the Department's medical director for those youth requiring medication management as a result of their drug addiction.

#### SOMATIC HEALTH SERVICES

The Somatic Health Services Unit provides comprehensive, quality health care and nutritional services in an integrated fashion to address the full range of needs of the youth and to ensure a continuum of care in the DJS residential programs. The unit's mission is to protect, promote, and advance the health of all youth in the care of the Department.

The health care system provides medical, dental, optometry, midwifery, pharmacy, and dietetic services in an interdisciplinary fashion that is

developmentally appropriate for youth. These services are delivered in accordance with the standards of care set forth by the National Commission on Correctional Health Care, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Centers for Disease Control, and the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Academy of Sciences.

Youth admitted to DJS residential programs require ongoing, routine preventative health care. In some cases, youth may have unmet or chronic health care needs upon admission or may develop an acute health condition that needs to be addressed. The Department ensures that each program has licensed nurses and clinical practitioners, as well as comprehensive laboratory and pharmacy services, to meet the health care needs of the youth. The health centers provide health care accessibility 24/7 with infirmary care for higher acuity medical needs. For specialty, surgical, emergency, or in-patient care that may be required, youth are transported to community providers as needed.

Each youth must have a current nursing assessment, history and physical examination, vision screening, and dental screening upon admission. Additionally, youth are screened or tested for anemia and infectious diseases including tuberculosis, COVID-19, sexually transmitted infections, and HIV. Comprehensive gynecological care is provided either on-site or in the community in order to meet individual needs.

Immunization records are requested for all youth, and DJS makes every effort to fully immunize youth who are not up to date on recommended and required vaccinations. DJS participates in the Federal Vaccines for Children Program.

The care and services delivered, as well as the performance of the private health care providers, are continually monitored by the Office of Somatic Health Services in order to ensure compliance and optimal quality of care.

#### **EDUCATIONAL SERVICES**

The Juvenile Services Education Program's (JSEP) primary focus is to provide exceptional educational opportunities to students and assist them in accruing credits toward graduation or to receive a diploma by examination (GED). JSEP utilizes a combination of online course providers and blended learning courses facilitated by JSEP teachers to provide credit recovery and original credit opportunities for students. Online course providers afford students the opportunity to retake courses to obtain the mastery needed for credit to use towards graduation requirements. If a student has successfully attained their high school diploma or GED, higher education courses are available through three community college partnerships (see the JSEP Section on page 12 for more information).

#### **R**ECREATIONAL SERVICES

Structured recreation programs are available to all youth in detention. The recreation program provides a variety of activities promoting physical health and wellness. Youth are required by policy to participate in recreational activities for a minimum of one hour per day; however, DJS provides programming opportunities that far exceed this minimum requirement.

Changing Habits and Making Progressive Strides (C.H.A.M.P.S.) is an incentive-based program that provides youth opportunities to compete with other facilities through recreation, arts, athletic, and academic events.

# **Pending Placement**

#### PENDING PLACEMENT (POST-DISPOSITION)

Youth who have been committed to the custody of the Department for residential placement may be placed in detention on a temporary basis by the juvenile court. Youth detained post-disposition are considered to be 'pending placement' as they are waiting to be placed into an out-of-home treatment program for committed youth.

Youth who are pending placement receive the same core services as listed above for pre-disposition cases.


In accordance with DJS policy, youth receive visits from their community case manager within the first 10 days of detention and every 14 days after their initial visit. Each facility also allows family visitation daily.

A court review hearing is held in accordance with Md. Code's Courts and Judicial Proceedings Article, §3-8A-15(k) for any youth in detention 14 days after the court has made a disposition. At the hearing, DJS is required to explain the reasons for continued detention. The court will continue to conduct a hearing every 14 days thereafter until a youth has been placed.

During the pending placement period, the facility and community case managers maintain contact with the youth's family and are also responsible for reporting to the juvenile court regarding the youth's placement status. In addition to court review, pending placement cases are reviewed by the Department on a weekly basis at facility management meetings. Regional-level meetings are held monthly to review placement statistics and identify barriers to placement and ways to expedite the process.

### PENDING PLACEMENT AFTER REMOVAL FROM A TREATMENT PROGRAM FOR COMMITTED YOUTH

Some youth committed to the custody of the Department cannot be safely maintained in their program and must be removed. Youth removed from a treatment program who require a new committed

placement are often placed in detention. Those with a new offense would be considered Pre-Disposition (Pre-D).


While detained pending a new placement, the Department's Central Review Committee (CRC) re-evaluates the youth's case and works to secure acceptance to the most appropriate alternative program.Youth ultimately placed in a committed treatment program are transferred as soon as possible based on available bed space.

#### A Note to Readers:

**Placements versus Admissions:** A placement is based on a decision made by an intake officer or judge to place a youth into detention. An admission occurs when a youth physically enters a facility either through direct placement or through transfer. Therefore, during one placement, a youth may have several admissions, and these counts will not match.

Pages that present statewide data report placements, while facilityspecific pages report admissions. The only exceptions are tables that present data that are collected once upon placement, such as risk level. These are reported as placements.

# **DJS Secure Detention Facilities by Region**






# **Total Statewide Activity for Detention Centers**


DJS operates five detention facilities across the State following the temporary closure of Noyes in October 2022. Each facility accommodates youth awaiting juvenile court disposition (Pre-D) and youth committed to DJS by the juvenile court and pending placement in a treatment program (Post-D). The removal population represents youth returned to detention following removal from a treatment program, with no new offenses requiring court processing and needing a new placement. Youth with pending adult criminal charges may also be held in DJS detention facilities (*see pages 128-129 for more detail*). These youth are included in the data presented except for demographic, offense, and risk level tables/charts.

- 91.8% of placements were from regions within Maryland. Of those from out of state, there were 74 from Washington, D.C.; 8 from Virginia; 6 from Delaware; 3 from Pennsylvania; and 1 each from California, Georgia, Illinois, Kansas, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Vermont, and West Virginia.
- Placement Trends:
  - Total placements increased 20.6% between FY 2021 and FY 2023 and increased 21.2% between FY 2022 and FY 2023.
  - Pre-D placements decreased 5.1% between FY 2021 and FY 2023 and increased 13.2% between FY 2022 and FY 2023.
  - Post-D placements increased 31.2% between FY 2021 and FY 2023 and increased 26.0% between FY 2022 and FY 2023.
  - Removal placements increased 130.0% between FY 2021 and FY 2023 and increased 213.6% between FY 2022 and FY 2023.
  - Adult Court placements increased 94.4% between FY 2021 and FY 2023 and increased 24.2% between FY 2022 and FY 2023.
- Average Length of Stay (ALOS) in Days:
  - For cases involving a transfer from facility to facility, the total ALOS is reflected on the statewide pages. The specific facility's page reflects only the ALOS at that particular facility.
  - ALOS for Pre-D decreased 19.3% between FY 2021 and FY 2023 and decreased 24.3% between FY 2022 and FY 2023.
  - Post-D ALOS increased 38.0% between FY 2021 and FY 2023 and increased 30.5% between FY 2022 and FY 2023.
  - ALOS for removals increased 26.3% between FY 2021 and FY 2023 and increased 20.4% between FY 2022 and FY 2023.
  - ALOS for Adult Court decreased 26.2% between FY 2021 and FY 2023 and increased 0.3% between FY 2022 and FY 2023.
- Pre-D Offense Category (Most Serious Offense) Trends FY 2021-2023:
  - The percentage of Crimes of Violence increased from 40.3% to 42.9%.
  - The percentage of Felonies increased from 20.3% to 22.8%.





### ADP BY PLACEMENT TYPE, FY 2021-2023





## ALOS BY PLACEMENT TYPE, FY 2021-2023






# Female Statewide Activity for Detention Centers


In FY 2023, Alfred D. Noyes Children's Center (closed October 18, 2022), Lower Eastern Shore Children's Center, and CheltenhamYouth Detention Center served girls. Western Maryland Children's Center also maintained beds for girls as needed. Some youth are detained awaiting disposition (Pre-D), and some are post-disposition (Post-D) awaiting placement in a treatment program. The removal population represents youth returned to detention following removal from a treatment program, with no new offenses requiring court processing and needing a new placement. Data include youth charged as adults pending transfer (*see pages 128-129 for more detail*), except for demographic, offense, and risk level tables/charts.

  - Post-D placements decreased 42.9% between FY 2021 and FY 2023 and increased 6.7% between FY 2022 and FY 2023.
  - Removal placements decreased 28.6% between FY 2021 and FY 2023 and increased 66.7% between FY 2022 and FY 2023.
  - Adult Court placements increased 100.0% between FY 2021 and FY 2023 and increased 66.7% between FY 2022 and FY 2023.





#### ADP BY PLACEMENT TYPE, FY 2021-2023





### ALOS BY PLACEMENT TYPE, FY 2021-2023







# **Under Age 13 Statewide Activity for Detention Centers**

Youth who are under 13 years of age represent a small population of youth detained in DJS detention centers. Rather than placing these youth in a detention facility, DJS most frequently uses an alternative to detention (ATD) with placement at home or in a shelter. However, if a youth must be in a detention center, they are housed with youth closest in age and size. If deemed highly vulnerable, they may be placed in the infirmary, with one-on-one staff supervision or sent to a smaller facility with a lower population. Regardless of placement type, youth under 13 receive the same services as other detained youth. *Note: youth under age 13 are not eligible to be charged in adult court.*





#### ADP BY PLACEMENT TYPE, FY 2021-2023













### ADP BY PLACEMENT TYPE, FY 2021-2023





# Youth Charged as Adults Pending Transfer

Youth ages 17 and under charged with a crime excluded from original juvenile court jurisdiction may be held in adult detention centers, pending trial. If ordered by the court, youth charged as adults that are eligible to file for transfer of charges to juvenile court may be held in a secure juvenile detention facility pending a transfer hearing to determine if jurisdiction should remain in the adult court or be transferred to the juvenile court. (Md. Code, Criminal Procedure, §4-202). DJS previously entered into agreements with local criminal justice agencies to house such youth. The statute was amended in 2015, which allowed transfer-eligible youth charged as adults to be held in a secure juvenile detention facility pending that transfer decision unless: (1) the youth is released; (2) there is no capacity in the secure juvenile facility; or (3) the court finds that detention in a secure juvenile facility would pose a risk of harm to the child or others, and states the reason on record. Data in this section represent youth held in DJS detention facilities for the adult court pending a transfer hearing. This section also provides information on youth whose complaints were transferred to the juvenile court, though they may or may not have been detained during the report year.

#### ADP BY ADMISSION TYPE, FY 2021-2023





#### ADP BY ADMISSION TYPE, FY 2021-2023







#### ADP BY ADMISSION TYPE, FY 2021-2023









#### ADP BY ADMISSION TYPE, FY 2021-2023





## ALOS BY ADMISSION TYPE, FY 2021-2023









#### ADP BY ADMISSION TYPE, FY 2021-2023







#### ADP BY ADMISSION TYPE, FY 2021-2023





# Alternatives to Detention (ATD)

DJS has a variety of programs designed to safely supervise and monitor youth in the community as an alternative to secure detention. ATDs include Community Detention (CD) – with or without Electronic/GPS Monitoring (EM) – and DJS-managed Evening Reporting Centers (ERC) serving females and males. DJS also contracts with private providers for additional ERC programming, including the Pre-Adjudication Coordination and Transition Center (PACT) for Baltimore City males, Pride Youth Service for youth in Montgomery County, and Lead for Life, Inc., for youth in Anne Arundel and Wicomico Counties. Shelter beds may also serve as ATDs when release-eligible youth are unable to return home. If a youth is presented at intake for detention, DJS staff may assign an ATD based on the youth's risk level (placements must be reviewed by the juvenile court the next day). The juvenile court may also assign an ATD directly. These alternatives allow youth to remain at home or in shelter care to continue school or work and maintain community ties/programs that mitigate risk while awaiting adjudication. Youth on ATD supervision are expected to appear for scheduled hearings, abide by ATD program guidelines, and not incur any new offenses.


