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A Word from the Secretary...

Welcome to the 10th edition of the Department of Juvenile Services' Data Resource Guide (DRG). Our Department is a data-driven agency, and the data we collect not only impacts our decision-making, but also decisions made by many of our stakeholders related to policy and practice. The information contained in the DRG provides a detailed look at our system and the ongoing trends in recent years. We publish the DRG every year to meet statutory obligations and provide transparency to our partners both on the local and State level as well as the general public. I hope that the DRG provides the information you need as well as insight into Maryland's juvenile justice system.

This year the COVID-19 pandemic impacted DJS operations, both in facility management and the number of youth served. As Maryland schools shifted to virtual learning and more families stayed home to limit the spread of the virus, juvenile complaints statewide dropped nearly 60% in the latter half of FY 2020. As the pandemic spread, DJS sought to limit youth

involvement in the juvenile justice system by identifying low-risk and non-violent offenders for release from DJS facilities. Detention and committed populations declined nearly 50% between February and June of 2020. Efforts to release low-risk offenders while still protecting public safety succeeded, as high-risk youth accounted for the majority of offenders in DJS detention facilities by July 2020.

Since the beginning of the health crisis, DJS worked extensively to minimize the impact of COVID-19 on our operations and implement practices and protocols that were consistent with guidance provided by the Maryland Department of Health and the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) to keep our youth and staff safe.

The Department also remains transparent with the information it shares related to COVID-19. DJS updates its COVID-19 webpage and hotline on a regular basis, with the latest statistics and protocols.

Despite the tragedies that many of us have suffered this year, our staff have persevered and have done a fantastic job mitigating the virus, as we continue to serve the youth and families of Maryland. The Department has taken advantage of these unprecedented times in reducing incarceration. It has not only aided in mitigating the spread of the virus, but also mitigated long-standing areas needing improvement such as racial disparities and using incarceration for low-level offenders.

In the coming month, DJS will continue to implement system-wide interventions, including those focused on equity and diversion. These and many other improvements were discussed within the Juvenile Justice Reform Council (JJRC), which was established in 2019 by the Maryland Legislature. The group's recommendations were forwarded to the Maryland General Assembly for consideration.

As always, a huge thanks goes out to everyone involved with the production of the DRG, especially the Department's Research and Evaluation Unit, who analyzed and compiled the data. Without their hard work and dedication, the DRG would not exist. I also need to recognize the amazing staff we have at DJS. You continue to serve our youth and families, no matter what the challenge.

I look forward to building on our successes. We are committed to improving the lives of young people, making communities safer, and changing Maryland for the better.

DJS' COVID-19 Pandemic Response

Seemingly overnight, the COVID-19 pandemic forced individuals, businesses, and government to drastically alter daily routines, practices, and policies to reduce the spread of the virus. Institutions large and small have had to adjust to the "new normal," and juvenile justice systems have not been spared. Maryland's government responded quickly to contain the virus, and the Department moved to protect the youth under its supervision and direct care staff working with youth, while protecting public safety.

DJS implemented a series of practices and protocols consistent with guidance provided by the Maryland Department of Health (MDH) and the federal Centers for Disease Control (CDC). Immediate actions included providing masks and other personal protective equipment (PPE) for direct care employees, telework for eligible employees, stepped-up cleaning and disinfection procedures, and social distancing within youth facilities. Below is a timeline for major actions in response to the pandemic:

Timeline of Maryland DJS 2020 COVID-19 Response:

March:

- -Governor Hogan declares state of emergency.
- -State institutes Elevated Level 2 Pandemic Response, mandating telework for most state employees.
- -DJS implements Limited Access Protocols, restricting movement throughout the department, and adopts limited non-essential facility transfers. DJS closes some facilities, moving youth within them to other facilities.
- -DJS creates new medical isolation units within its facilities for youth who test positive for COVID-19. Likewise, dedicated units are created for new admissions to isolate prior to placement in general housing units.
- -DJS staff begin universal case reviews for all youth in custody and expedite releases where agreed to by the court.
- -DJS implements virtual contacts by Community Services staff for youth under community supervision.

April:

- -Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals orders juvenile courts to limit detention or commitment, unless necessary to protect the health and safety of the youth and public.
- -Maryland DBM institutes COVID-19 response pay to certain groups of essential employees, who receive a pay differential of \$3.13 per hour, and an additional \$2.00 per hour for staff required to work in designated quarantine areas.
- -DJS implements a mandatory screening questionnaire, regarding virus-like symptoms, for all staff and visitors to access DJS buildings, including offices and facilities.
- -DJS expands distribution of facility personal protective equipment (PPE) statewide, providing additional resources to all facilities and vendor group homes.
- -DJS initiates mandatory social distancing requirements for all youth in facilities when working on academic activities during school hours and in the unit.
- -DJS begins publishing daily tracking reports showing numbers of youth and staff tested and positive cases.
- -DJS introduces a new Quality Assurance COVID-19 audit tool for review. The tool creates new standards for best practices across facilities in management, inspection, and performance review.
- -Most Maryland circuit courts reduce or suspend operations.
- -DJS implements virtual-only facility visits by family and public defenders.

May:

-Governor Hogan announces universal testing at Maryland's prisons and juvenile facilities.

June:

-The courts enter the first phase of a gradual return to full operations. This initial step adds arraignments, hearings without witnesses, treatment plan reviews, and non-contested hearings to the list of authorized juvenile court matters. Contested matters including adjudications and transfer/waiver hearings resume on July 20, with the juvenile court reaching fully operational status on August 31.

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DJS operations were greatly affected by the pandemic response, both in the number of youth served and the way cases and facilities were managed. The number of juvenile complaints referred to DJS declined sharply in the months after the pandemic began, which was likely impacted by schools moving to virtual classrooms and families staying home to reduce the spread of COVID-19. Statewide, juvenile complaints dropped nearly 60% between February 2020 (prior to the impact of COVID-19) and the end of the fiscal year in June 2020.

Community supervision policies were adjusted to allow for virtual contacts - phone or video - for youth under supervision. When required, Community Detention Officers, equipped with adequate PPE, managed in-person responses. DJS staff identified community-based resources and supports to connect families to organizations that provide food, health resources, and crisis interventions. DJS also assisted in promoting remote programming with community-based service providers. Maryland's government instituted mandatory telework for eligible employees and also gave an hourly pay increase to community detention employees working directly with youth.

COVID-19 thrives on density, and as Maryland cases continued to rise, DJS implemented systematic screening and testing protocols at offices and facilities. Admissions, transfers, and visitations were reduced or eliminated. Dedicated admission and quarantine units were created to allow physical separation of youth who had yet to be tested, those who had tested negative, and youth showing symptoms and/or testing positive. All youth entering into detention were monitored for symptom development for a 14-days. Units were kept to a maximum capacity of eight youth. DJS initiated a weekly detention review process, designed to reduce detention populations by working with the juvenile courts to release lower-risk youth and non-violent offenders.

In addition to these measures, DJS suspended all family face-to-face visits with youth in facilities to protect the safety of youth, family, and staff. To keep youth connected with families, the Department increased the number of youth phone calls allowed daily and increased its use of virtual visits. DJS supported youth access to counsel through telephone calls and video visits. In-person visitation was available when necessary.

As essential employees, DJS behavioral health staff continued to provide services and interventions to youth in facilities. Telepsychiatry and other telemedicine services provided further support for youth, providing continuity of care. DJS collaborated with the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) to ensure continuity of educational services, either through a distance learning model or through classroom instruction. Youth attended classes in small groups to adhere to social distancing guidelines.

All youth and staff in DJS facilities were provided masks and were required to wear them at all times. DJS made all necessary PPE available, including gowns, gloves, face shields, and hand sanitizer, working closely with MDH and the governor's office to restock this equipment as needed.

The lower number of admissions and the comprehensive case reviews for confined youth offered DJS the opportunity to accelerate some ongoing system reform efforts. In recent years, the Department has made concerted efforts to divert lower-risk youth from system involvement, reserving confinement for those youth posing a higher risk to public safety. Between February and June of 2020, the average daily population (ADP) in DJS detention facilities declined 49%. Further, the review process appeared to be successful in identifying non-violent youth for release while still protecting public safety. In March 2020, for example, DJS had 108 youth in its detention facilities, with youth accused of violent crimes representing only 29% of the population. By July 2020, that number fell to only 43, with violent offenders accounting for 53% of the total. The overall reduction in DJS facility populations also helped reduce racial and ethnic disparities in populations. In February 2020, for example, youth of color represented nearly 80% of overall facility populations. By July 2020, that proportion had fallen to about 68%.

DJS reforms in response to COVID-19 also impacted committed programming. The agency implemented monthly planning reviews to track the status and progress of treatment plans for youth. This process helped ensure that length of stay aligned with treatment goals. The planning reviews also examined discharge and aftercare planning. Family engagement was an important element of the process as well, embedding family and youth involvement in every step of the process. Between February and July of 2020, the average committed population dropped by 48%. These declines affected DJS commitment and private facilities as well as out-of-state contracted committed programs.

It should be clear that the FY 2020 caseload and population data presented in this Data Resource Guide were greatly impacted by the pandemic. Some declines were a direct result of reductions in complaints and court actions, while others were the result of policy changes and reforms, some of which, if successful, may persist beyond the pandemic. So when looking at the declines from previous years, or projecting future caseloads and populations, it is important to note that it is unknown which of these trends will reverse and which might continue and become the new normal.

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Terms and Concepts

Absent Without Leave (AWOL): A youth who absconds from a non-secure residential program.

Accountability Incentives Management (AIM): A structured statewide system of responses to deter negative behaviors and encourage positive behaviors of youth under court-ordered community supervision. AIM seeks to reduce technical violations of supervision by ensuring certain, fair, and immediate responses to youth behavior that promote successful completion of supervision.

Adjudicatory Hearing: A proceeding before a juvenile judge or magistrate to determine whether allegations made against a youth are true. If the allegations concerning the commitment of a delinquent act are found to be true, the youth may be adjudicated delinquent.

Admission: See definition for "commitment versus admission" and "placement versus admission."

Aftercare: Supervision and individualized treatment services provided to youth in the community following discharge from a residential program. A youth is assigned an aftercare worker at the time of commitment.

Alternatives to Detention (ATD): Community-based program options that provide structured supervision and accountability of youth who would otherwise be detained pending adjudicatory hearings in the juvenile court.

Automated Statewide System of Information Support Tools (ASSIST): DJS client database.

Average Daily Population (ADP): Daily population of youth averaged over the number of days in a given time period.

Average Length of Stay (ALOS): Average total number of days in residential placement between admission and release. Youth detained in more than one facility during a contiguous stay are counted as a single placement.

Behavioral Health Diversion Initiative (BHDI): An initiative funded by the Annie E. Casey Foundation to screen and divert youth for mental health services.

Case Management Specialist (CMS): DJS staff who provide case management services to youth in community and residential settings. Case managers provide supervision, develop treatment plans, link youth with necessary resources and services, monitor progress, and modify treatment plans as needed.

Central Review Committee (CRC): A central committee that convenes weekly to hear case reviews of youth at risk of removal from a committed placement, direct changes in the youths' provision of services, and make youth placement transfer decisions. Members include the Directors of the Behavioral Health and Resource Offices, the Executive Directors of Residential Placements and Community Supervision, and a representative from the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE).

Certificate of Placement (COP): The document which reflects a youth's placement location, services, and authorizes service payment.

CHALLENGE: A behavior modification program focused on improving youth behavior and maintaining safety and security for youth in DJS detention facilities. It helps youth develop positive behaviors through a system of rewards and support and teaches youth to take responsibility for their behavior. In DJS committed facilities the program has been updated to incorporate PBIS principles and was renamed STARR in 2018.

Child in Need of Assistance (CINA): A youth who is found by the court to require court intervention, such as removal from the home and placement with a foster family or relative, because of abuse or neglect by a parent, guardian, or other person responsible for their care.

Child in Need of Supervision (CINS): A youth who is found by the court to need guidance, treatment, or rehabilitation because the youth committed an offense applicable only to children, is habitually truant, poses a risk of injury to themselves or others, or who is ungovernable (See definition for "Ungovernable").

Commitment versus Admission: A commitment is a court order placing a delinquent youth in DJS' care, which usually results in placement into an out-of-home program, but in some cases services may instead be provided in home. An admission occurs when a youth physically arrives at a facility and is officially entered onto the facility's roster, and this normally occurs some weeks after the court order. A single admission to an out-of-home program could be the result of multiple commitments - a youth may be committed by more than one court, or be committed on multiple charges - and a youth may be admitted to several programs under a single commitment order. Thus, the number of commitments will not equal the number of admissions to committed programs.

Introduction



Community Detention (CD): A DJS program that monitors a delinquent child or a child alleged to be delinquent who is placed in the home of a parent, guardian, custodian, other fit person, or in shelter care, as a condition of probation or as an alternative to detention (ATD). Community detention often includes electronic monitoring (EM).

Complaint: A written statement made by any person or agency to a DJS intake officer which, if true, would support allegations of a juvenile petition.

Crimes of Violence: Offenses designated as crimes of violence in Maryland's Annotated Code (see Appendix K for more detail). Includes primarily felony offenses, but some misdemeanors.

Crossover Youth Practice Model (CYPM): A program to coordinate casework of youth who are dually involved in both the juvenile justice system and the child welfare system and foster increased communication and collaboration between the staff members of DJS and local Department of Social Services. DJS partnered with Georgetown University to implement the CYPM in Prince George's County in 2015. Since then, the model is being slowly rolled out in other Maryland counties.

Day/Evening Reporting Center (D/ERC): A program that serves youth as an alternative to detention. Youth are required to report daily to ensure the youth are monitored and get back to court for hearings.

Delinquent Act: An act which would be a crime if committed by an adult.

Delinquent Child: A child who has committed a delinquent act and requires guidance, treatment, or rehabilitation.

Detention: The temporary care of respondents who, pending court dispositions and other hearings, require secure custody for the protection of themselves or the community, in physically restricting facilities or circumstances. A youth may be detained if a court determines that they might fail to appear for a future hearing, continue to break the law, or pose a threat to the public or themselves. Detention may be utilized pending a court hearing or after disposition. A youth's detention status is required to be reviewed every 30 days.

Detention Hearing: A court proceeding to determine whether a youth shall be placed in or continue in detention.

Detention Risk Assessment Instrument (DRAI): An assessment of a youth's risk to reoffend and/or fail to appear for future court dates used to guide whether the youth should be detained, placed in a detention alternative, or released to a parent/guardian.

Direct Care Staff: An employee whose primary duty is to provide direct supervision of youth.

Disposition: The action taken by the juvenile court that outlines whether the youth requires guidance, treatment, or rehabilitation and, if so, the nature of such assistance, e.g., probation terms or commitment. (Note: In adult courts, this is known as a "sentence.")

Disproportionate Minority Contact (DMC): A rate of contact with the juvenile justice system among youth of a specific minority group that is significantly different than the rate of contact for whites (i.e., non-Hispanic Caucasians) or for other minority groups (See RRI definition).

Diversion: A program or practice where the primary goal is to reduce the occurrence of juvenile delinquency by diverting a youth from the traditional juvenile justice system and providing an alternative to formal processing. Diversion programs and practices vary in terms of the juvenile justice contact point at which the youth is diverted and the types of services provided. Youth may be diverted by law enforcement before arrest, during DJS intake, or between adjudication and disposition.

Ejection from Committed Placement: A youth's removal from an out-of-home placement upon determination that the youth failed to comply with the rules and conditions of the program. Following an ejection, a youth may require a new out-of-home placement. A youth may remain in detention pending a new placement.

Electronic Monitoring (EM): A statewide program providing close monitoring of youth in the community as an alternative to residential placement/detention. Youth wear an ankle bracelet that electronically monitors their movement and compliance to established location parameters. This may involve the use of global positioning systems (GPS).

Escape: Absconding from a secure DJS residential program (including Youth Centers) or detention facility (including Community Detention).

Evidence-Based Services (EBS): Programs that have been found to be effective based on the results of rigorous evaluations.

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Family Centered Treatment (FCT): A family preservation model of in-home treatment provided in Maryland by Mentor Maryland. The Mentor Maryland team utilizes FCT to help families learn and adopt positive behavioral patterns.

Family Engagement: A collaborative relationship between families and DJS throughout the youth's involvement in the system.

Felony vs. Misdemeanor: In Maryland a crime is either a felony or a misdemeanor. Generally, felonies are the more serious of these two types of crimes. However, there is no clear line for determining whether a crime is a felony or misdemeanor based on the statutory maximum penalty associated with the offense. Unless specified in a statute or the offense was a felony at common law, a crime is considered a misdemeanor. Most statutes specify whether a crime is a misdemeanor or a felony. Common law crimes retain common law grades as either felonies or misdemeanors unless changed through the legislative process. The General Assembly may choose to label a statutory crime a felony or misdemeanor independent of the amount of punishment the statute provides. The General Assembly may also choose to change the status of a crime from a misdemeanor to a felony or a felony to a misdemeanor.

Fiscal Year (FY): The time period measured from July 1st of one year to June 30th of the following year. FY 2020 runs from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020.

For Authorization of Formal Petition (FAFP): A decision by a DJS intake officer to authorize the State's Attorney to petition the court for formal processing.

Functional Family Therapy (FFT - an EBS): An outcome-driven prevention/intervention program for youth demonstrating the entire range of maladaptive behaviors such as delinquency, violence, substance use, Conduct Disorder, Oppositional Defiant Disorder, or Disruptive Behavior Disorder. Flexible delivery of service is provided by one- or two-person teams to clients in home, clinic, school, juvenile court, community-based programs, and at re-entry from institutional placement.

Global Positioning System (GPS): A global navigation satellite system that provides location and time information for youth monitored with a global positioning system receiver.

Group Home: A residential program licensed by DHS, DJS, or MHA/MDH to provide 24-hour supervised out-of-home care for 4 or more youth providing a formal program of basic care, social work, and health care services.

Hardware Secure Facility: A facility that relies primarily on the use of construction and hardware such as locks, bars, and fences to restrict freedom.

Informal Supervision: See definition for "Pre-Court Supervision."

Intake: The process for reviewing a complaint against a youth and determining whether the juvenile court has jurisdiction and whether judicial action is in the best interest of the public and/or the youth. During intake, youth and their family may be offered services. DJS has statutory authority to screen all juvenile complaints referred.

Juvenile Court: A division of the Circuit Court in Maryland.

Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI): A best practice model that addresses inappropriate and unnecessary use of detention and reduces the failures of juveniles to appear in court. A primary goal of JDAI is to reduce overcrowding in detention centers by safely maintaining youth in the community in detention alternatives without jeopardizing public safety or increasing the number of youth who fail to appear for court.

Juvenile Justice Monitoring Unit (JJMU): Administratively housed in the Office of the Attorney General, the unit investigates the needs of children under the jurisdiction of DJS and determines whether their needs are being met in compliance with State law. This includes evaluating the conditions of youth housing, reporting on treatment of and services to youth, and investigating allegations of child abuse.

Juvenile Justice Reform Council: Established by law in 2019 for two years, the council has members from all three branches of State government, other key stakeholders, and national experts. It is charged to develop a statewide framework of policies to invest in strategies to increase public safety and reduce recidivism of youth offenders, using a data-driven approach.

Introduction



Juvenile Services Education System (JSES): A part of the Maryland Department of Education, JSES provides educational services to detained and committed youth in DJS facilities across the state.

Maryland Comprehensive Assessment and Service Planning (MCASP): MCASP uses integrated case management to assess risks and needs of youth throughout their DJS involvement and develop interventions to accomplish the goals of public safety and youth rehabilitation. MCASP enables DJS to strengthen individualized service plans for youth and families and match them with appropriate services/programs, to track youth progress, and to ensure that each youth receives the level of supervision consistent with his or her risk to public safety.

Maryland Evaluation and Treatment Services (METS - formerly SMART): A web-based platform that provides key case management functions, including assessments, contacts, and treatment service planning in coordination with the DJS ASSIST system.

Maryland Longitudinal Data System (MLDS): A research data center established by State law in 2010 to allow research and policy evaluation using matched, then de-identified data from the State education, workforce, and (as of October 2019) DJS data systems.

Maryland Police and Correctional Training Commissions (MPCTC): Under DPSCS, MPCTC is vested with the authority to set standards of initial selection and training for all governmental law enforcement, correctional, parole and probation, and juvenile services employees in the State of Maryland, and to otherwise upgrade the professionalism of these officers. MPCTC provides certification and ongoing training to DJS staff.

Misdemeanor: See definition for "felony versus misdemeanor."

Multidisciplinary Assessment Staffing Team (MAST): A specialized regional diagnostic team responsible for assessing and evaluating youth who are detained and at risk of out-of-home placement, prior to disposition. Following the in-depth review, the MAST prepares security and treatment recommendations to the juvenile court. The MAST includes psychologists, social workers, community and facility case managers and supervisors, resource specialists, MSDE representatives, and individuals from other disciplines as needed.

Multisystemic Therapy (MST - an EBS): An intensive family- and community-based treatment program that addresses the serious anti-social behavior of juvenile offenders. The major goal of MST is to empower parents and youth with the skills and resources needed to independently resolve the difficulties that arise in coping with family, peer, school, and neighborhood problems. Intervention strategies include family therapy, structural family therapy, behavioral parent training, and cognitive behavior therapies. MST is a home-based model of service delivery.

Pending Placement: A temporary status for youth who have been committed for placement in an out-of-home residential facility and are awaiting placement, including youth ejected from a committed placement. Youth may be "pending placement" in a variety of settings including: detention facility, home, home with additional services, home under community detention and/or electronic monitoring, family shelter care, structured shelter care, acute care hospitals, or psychiatric respite care programs.

Petition: A formal written request filed by the State's Attorney's Office with the juvenile court alleging that a child is delinquent, in need of supervision (CINS) or in need of assistance (CINA).

Placement versus Admission: A placement is based on a decision made by an intake officer or judge to place a youth into detention or a committed program. An admission occurs when a youth physically enters a facility either through direct placement or through transfer. Thus, during one placement, a youth may have several admissions, and these counts will not match.

Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS): An implementation framework for maximizing the selection and use of evidence-based prevention and intervention practices along a multi-tiered continuum that supports the academic, social, emotional, and behavioral competence of youth in DJS facilities. PBIS principles guide the provision of medical, behavioral health, education, and recreation services, as well as Trauma Informed Care (TIC) and DJS' STARR program. Facility teams use data on youth behavior to evaluate the effectiveness of facility operations, and youth behaviors and progress.

Pre-Adjudication Coordination and Training (PACT): PACT Evening Reporting Center serves youth 14 to 17 years of age in Baltimore City as an alternative to detention. It utilizes a youth development model and collaborates with participants, their families, DJS, and other partners to develop a plan to address the underlying issues which lead to anti-social or delinquent behavior.

Pre-Court Supervision: An agreement consented to by the youth, parent/guardian, and the victim diverting the case from formal court proceedings. The term is up to 90 days, and may be extended to 180 days for substance abuse and mental health treatment needs by DJS or as otherwise ordered by the court. Failure to comply with the supervision agreement may result in a formal petition being filed.

Probation: Court-ordered supervision of youth in the community requiring youth to meet court-ordered probation conditions (general and case specific), including, for example, school attendance, employment, community service, restitution, counseling, or participation in substance abuse treatment.

Qualified ResidentialTreatment Program (QRTP): A residential program that has a trauma-informed treatment model designed to address the needs, including clinical needs as appropriate, of youth with serious emotional or behavioral disorders or disturbances; is able to implement the treatment identified for the youth within the required 30 calendar day assessment of the appropriateness of the placement; has registered or licensed nursing staff and other licensed clinical staff available on-site 24 hours a day, 7 days a week; and is accredited by any of the independent, not-for-profit organization approved Health and Human Service Administration

Racial Equity: A condition that would be achieved if one's racial or ethnic identity no longer predicted, in a statistical sense, how one fares.

Recidivism: Subsequent juvenile/adult delinquent or criminal involvement of youth released from committed residential programs or youth placed on probation.

Relative Rate Index (RRI): A measure of Disproportionate Minority Contact (DMC) with the juvenile justice system. It is a standardized tool used to assess the level of racial disparity introduced at each decision point (detention, court referral, etc.) For example, RRI compares the detention rate for white youth with the detention rate for youth of a specific minority group. (See Appendix O)

Re-entry: A broad term used to refer to the transition from out-of-home committed placement to community supervision. Generally, re-entry involves a plan to ensure youth are connected to school, employment, and continued treatment services when returning to the community.

Resident Advisor: DJS staff member who provides supervision, support, care, and monitoring of youth placed in DJS-operated facilities.

Residential Treatment Center (RTC): A mental health facility for children and adolescents with long-term serious emotional, behavioral, and psychological problems. RTCs provide intensive services and should only be considered when therapeutic services available in the community are insufficient to address a youth's needs. In addition to Maryland RTCs, DJS uses a variety of out-of-state providers, including RTCs funded through Medical Assistance, with rates set by the Maryland Interagency Rates Committee, and facilities that are not RTCs and serve moderate-to-high-risk multi-problem youth. These are youth who may be exhibiting moderate psychiatric symptoms and aggressive behavior, or who have histories of unsuccessful/repeated placements and/or hospitalizations. Treatment models vary depending on the client focus of the program, but all provide individualized treatment plans, are comprehensive in services, highly structured, treatment oriented, and behaviorally focused.

Residential Treatment Service Plan (RTSP): A structured treatment planning tool to guide treatment services for youth placed in DJS-operated committed programs.

Resolved at Intake: A determination by the DJS Intake officer that furthering the case by forwarding it to the State's Attorney's Office for formal processing or informal pre-court supervision would be disadvantageous to the interests of the youth and to public safety.

SafeMeasures: An analytic service provided by the National Council on Crime & Delinquency that provides timely management reports and indicators to DJS case management, supervisory, and executive staff. SafeMeasures pulls data from DJS' existing databases and creates visual indicators and reports to ensure that the agency's requirements for effective facility operations, case management, and supervision are tracked and met.

Safety Planning Initiative (SPI): An intense supervision initiative for youth in DJS care who are witnesses to, or victims of violent acts, or otherwise at risk of violence.

Shelter Care: Temporary, short-term (1-30 days), non-secure housing of youth who are awaiting court disposition. Shelter beds serve as an alternative to detention or other short-term circumstance where family or other housing is not available.

Social History Investigation (SHI - formerly PDI): The written study of a youth and his/her family that is presented to the juvenile court. A SHI emphasizes social and legal histories as well as the domain areas of: family functioning, substance abuse, mental health, somatic health, education, employment, and life skills.

Introduction



Social Skills Training and Aggression Replacement Techniques (START): Based on Aggression Replacement Training (ART), which is an evidence-based, cognitive behavioral, group intervention for committed youth with chronic aggression, START focuses on developing youth's social skills, anger control, and moral reasoning.

Spotlight on Schools (SOS) Program: An initiative to place case managers on-site at certain key schools across the state. DJS Spotlight workers monitor and respond immediately to attendance issues, referrals for disruptive behavior, suspensions, and drop-out issues for youth under DJS supervision, and offer prevention and early intervention services to other at-risk students. In addition, SOS workers provide immediate, on-site intake services for students involved in delinquent activity.

Staff Secure: Residential programs where youth movement is controlled by staff supervision rather than by restrictive architectural features.

STARR Program: An enhanced version of the CHALLENGE behavior modification program that incorporates PBIS principles and is focused on improving youth behavior. It is used throughout each committed facility, as all staff and youth are involved in the program. The STARR program teaches youth skills to address negative behaviors and emotions and develop positive behaviors through a structured reinforcement system that includes rewards, supports, and levels. Youth are taught to take responsibility for their behavior, and a safe, predictable, and positive environment is maintained within facilities. It accomplishes these goals by focusing on the following positive behaviors that are captured in the STARR acronym: Solve Problems in a Mature and Responsible Manner; Task Focused; Act as a Role Model; Respect Self, Others, Facility Property, and Rules; Responsible for my Behavior.

State Advisory Board: The Board consists of 21 members appointed by the Governor for 3-year terms. By law, it includes at least one youth member who was under the Department's jurisdiction and also a parent or guardian of a youth who was under the Department's supervision. The Board recommends to the Secretary of Juvenile Services policies and programs to improve State juvenile services. The Board helps plan development, use of resources, and helps inform the public of the Department's work.

Trauma, Addictions, Mental Health, and Recovery for Youth (TAMAR-Y): A structured trauma education group that teaches youth to identify stress and trauma triggers. Youth also learn skills such as deep breathing and mindfulness techniques to address their reactions to stress and trauma triggers. TAMAR-Y uses a multimedia approach that includes videos to stimulate discussion, and incorporates expressive arts therapies that involve writing and drawing activities to engage youth and help them develop a better understanding of their experiences. Some of the topics covered in groups include: Understanding Trauma's Impact, Dealing with Triggers, Trauma and Addiction - How We Cope, Keeping It Together - Containment, Who I Am, and Connections.

Trauma-Informed Care (TIC): A service delivery approach that takes into account past trauma and the resulting coping mechanisms when attempting to understand behaviors and provide services. Trauma-informed care is a framework or a lens through which we recognize the prevalence of early adversity in the lives of youth, view presenting problems as symptoms of maladaptive coping, and understand how early trauma shapes a youth's fundamental beliefs about the world and affects his or her behavior. In trauma-informed counseling clinicians apply the principles of trauma informed care by identifying youth's strengths and positive coping strategies in order to assist the youth in managing stress.

Treatment Service Plan (TSP): A written document identifying treatment objectives, services, and service linkages that address the needs of the youth and family. It also examines the safety and appropriateness of the youth's placement, guides DJS' recommendations to the juvenile court for permanency planning (where appropriate), and monitors level of supervision and services required.

Trauma Specific Treatment (TST): Treatment services that address traumatic stress as well as any co-occurring disorders (including substance use and mental disorders) that developed during or after trauma. Trauma Specific Treatments directly address trauma related symptoms and Posttraumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). Trauma Focused-Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT) is an example of a trauma specific treatment.

Under 13 (U-13) Initiative: A school-based intervention designed to provide support and services for juvenile offenders ages 12 years and younger through collaborative partnerships between DJS, Baltimore City/Prince George's County Public Schools, the local Department of Social Services, and other child-serving stakeholders.

Ungovernable: Being beyond the control of parents, guardians, or custodians or being disobedient of parental authority.

Violation of Probation (VOP): A hearing conducted by the court to determine if the conditions of community supervision have been violated. A VOP is considered a technical violation if it does not involve a new delinquent offense.

Youth: The preferred term for individuals under 18 years of age as used by DJS.

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Section I: An Overview of the Maryland Department of Juvenile Services

Introduction to the Maryland Department of Juvenile Services

The Department of Juvenile Services (DJS) is an executive agency charged with the responsibility of appropriately managing, supervising and treating youth who are involved in the juvenile justice system in Maryland. DJS provides individualized care and treatment to youth who have violated the law or who pose a safety risk to themselves or others. Objective screening and assessment tools are utilized to manage youth with the guidance of the data collected. DJS works with partners in the community to achieve meaningful improvements to the outcomes of the youth served.

OBJECTIVE ASSESSMENT TOOLS

Objective screening and assessment tools guide key decisions. For example, DJS Intake Officers are statutorily empowered to screen juvenile offenses and determine which complaints should be referred to the State's Attorney's Office (SAO) for formal court petitioning. This decision is guided by a validated, objective intake decision tool that identifies a youth's risk of recidivism, strengths, and service needs. Implemented in July 2020, and a part of the Maryland Comprehensive Assessment and Service Planning (MCASP) process, the tool is intended to ensure fair and equitable decisions that are developmentally appropriate, culturally proficient, and tailored to the risks, needs, and strengths of youth.

The Detention Risk Assessment Instrument (DRAI) evaluates whether a youth should be held in secure detention or placed in a supervised detention alternative while awaiting a hearing on the merits of a juvenile complaint. This tool helps the Department improve its detention practices by taking subjectivity out of the critical detention decision, with a goal of detaining only those youth who pose a risk to public safety, to themselves, or who would not otherwise appear in court.

If a youth has been adjudicated delinquent, the Department utilizes the MCASP Needs Assessment to identify the youth's treatment and security needs, which serve as the basis for the Treatment Service Plan (TSP) development. Using an objective instrument allows the Department to make better matches between youth and the course of treatment available within the continuum of care. The continuum of care spans in-home probation supervision with services, community-based out-of-home treatment, and state- and privately operated secure programs, all designed to address youth needs and the factors that led the youth to delinquent behavior.

Managing with Data

The information developed from assessment tools, as well as information collected by caseworkers, investigators, auditors, and facility staff, is used at all levels of DJS management. Data reports are available to field staff and managers through the Automated Statewide System of Information Support Tools (ASSIST), the Maryland Evaluation and Treatment Services (METS), and SafeMeasures reporting systems. Research and Evaluation staff regularly analyze data, generating reports for agency decision makers, the Governor's Office, and reports to the Maryland General Assembly. This *Data Resource Guide* represents the most comprehensive report of the Department's aggregated data. County- and program-level data are readily available to all. This is crucial for practitioners because statewide trends could mask local trends. As innovative new ways of examining information are uncovered, these will be incorporated into this publication.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

The Department's partnerships start in the community. Throughout the State, the Department works with local law enforcement, courts, health departments, attorneys, and other stakeholders to keep Department youth safe and supported. Field staff make referrals to community-based providers who help meet the treatment needs of youth under supervision in the community.

State partners, such as the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE), the Maryland Department of Human Services (DHS), and the Maryland Department of Health (MDH), collaborate at many levels to deliver services in the most effective manner. DJS also works closely with the Maryland State Police (MSP) and the Governor's Office of Crime Prevention, Youth, and Victim Services to ensure information is shared across agencies and public safety goals are met.

EQUITY

The DJS Racial Equity Framework is a series of actions taken to examine and develop solutions to agency policy and practices that may directly or indirectly yield racially disparate outcomes for youth and families of color. DJS actions for race equity include extensive staff capacity-building to engage in race equity dialogue and solutions, routine data collection and reporting on youth of color to help better understand the problem and to monitor progress of implemented equity reforms, use of a specialized equity lens to vet agency policy and practice for specific impact on youth of color, and adoption of model practices that are proven or promoted to be effective for youth and families of color. This work is led by the DJS Office of Equity and Reform, which is a dedicated unit of agency staff who focus on youth outcomes and targeted reforms for specific youth populations distinguished by race, ethnicity, gender, sex, and sexuality.



FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

DJS recognizes that family engagement is critical to positive outcomes for youth involved in the juvenile justice system. Keeping families engaged and informed throughout the legal process is a priority for the Department. The Office of Family Engagement works to ensure family members are knowledgeable about their loved one's detainment, court orders, treatment, supervision, and re-entry into their communities and schools. It also promotes the active participation of families in the process to support youth and reduce their risks for recidivism.


Re-Entry Strategic Plan Goals

DJS' Strategic Re-Entry Plan was developed and implemented in FY 2016 in collaboration with agency stakeholders. Representatives from the Judiciary, Office of the Public Defender, State's Attorney's Office, service providers, the advocacy community, and many levels of DJS staff were all included. The plan provides a framework of goals, objectives, performance measures, and strategic activities to ensure that youth released from committed placement can successfully transition to life in their home communities. Key plan objectives focus on transition planning, family engagement, school re-enrollment, and connecting youth to community service providers and work opportunities. Many of the planned initiatives have been implemented, including the creation of regional re-entry specialist and family engagement positions, checklists to ensure comprehensive discharge planning, and to collect key performance data both prior to and after release, and performance reports to ensure accountability and measure success.

- Goal 1: Reduce recidivism by providing supervision to all youth returning home from committed care.
- Goal 2: Engage families of committed youth at all key case planning decision points.
- Goal 3: Connect all committed youth needing educational services to local education resources.
- Goal 4: Connect all youth to local employment services and resources.
- Goal 5: Connect all youth in need of behavioral or somatic health services to local resources to provide continuity of care.









DJS Operating Expenditures, FY 2020

Juvenile Justice in Maryland - A Historical Evolution

1800s

- 1830: Maryland Legislature passed "An Act to Establish a House of Refuge for Juvenile Delinquents" that created for the first time an authority
 to provide "troubled children" with homes, education, and job training.
- 1850: House of Refuge opened.
- 1850-1882: Maryland built four "reform schools" for young people, governed by private boards and segregated by race and sex.
- 1866: Maryland Industrial School for Girls opened, operated under various names, finally as the Montrose School, and closed in 1988.
- 1870: House of Reformation & Instruction for Colored Children opened. It operated under various names, was renamed to the Cheltenham Youth Facility in 1992 and became Cheltenham Youth Detention Center in 2016.
- 1882: Industrial Home for Colored Girls opened. It merged with Montrose School for Girls in 1962.

1910-1918

House of Refuge (opened in 1850) became Maryland School for Boys (1910) and in 1918 became the Maryland Training School for Boys.

1922

• State Department of Education operated the training schools.

1943

State Department of Public Welfare, Bureau of Child Welfare, Division of Institutions operated the training schools.

1960s

- 1966-1969: State Department of Juvenile Services became the central coordinating agency for juvenile investigation, probation and aftercare services, and for State juvenile, diagnostic, training, detention, and rehabilitation institutions.
- 1967: State Department of Juvenile Services assumed administrative responsibilities for all State children's centers and boys' forestry camps.
- 1968: Patterson House (Group Home for Girls) opened. It closed in 1992.
- 1969: Department of Health and Mental Hygiene organized the Juvenile Services Administration to administer all schools, youth detention centers, forestry camps, and probation/aftercare programs.

1970s

- 1970: Alfred D. Noyes Children's Center opened in Montgomery County.
- 1972: Group Home for Boys opened; it became the William Donald Schaefer House in 1992.
- 1972: Maryland Youth Residence Center (MYRC) opened.

1980s

- 1982: J. DeWeese Carter Center opened.
- 1985: Maryland Training School for Boys became the Charles H. Hickey Jr. School (CHHS).
- 1987: Juvenile Services Administration became an independent agency.
- 1988: The Montrose School closed.
- 1989: The Department of Juvenile Services became a cabinet-level department.

1990s

- 1992: Victor Cullen Academy, which was a former tuberculosis sanatorium, opened.
- 1992: Boys' Village of Maryland was renamed to Cheltenham Youth Facility (CYF).
- 1999: In November, DJS replaced its existing mainframe application, Information System for Youth Services (ISYS), with a client-server system
 referred to as the Automated Statewide System of Information Support Tools (ASSIST).

2002

- Victor Cullen Academy closed.
- HB 1081 Required the establishment of a community detention program.



- HB 1011 Required the Department to operate the Baltimore City Juvenile Justice Center (BCJJC) as a centralized regional juvenile justice
 intake, assessment, court, and detention facility for Baltimore City and specified the powers and duties related to the Center.
- HB 962 Authorized the juvenile court to adopt a treatment service plan recommended by the Department in making a disposition on a specified petition. It also required DJS to ensure that a treatment service plan adopted by the court was implemented within 25 days after disposition.

2003

- Baltimore City Juvenile Justice Center opened in October.
- Under Education Article §22-305, the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) began to assume responsibility for educating youth in DJS facilities.

2004

- Day/Evening Reporting Center in Baltimore City opened in December.
- SB 767 Required a child discharged from a committed residential placement to receive step-down aftercare according to specified parameters.

2005

- Charles H. Hickey Jr. School Committed and Impact Programs closed in July.
- HB 1339 Required the Secretary of Juvenile Services to establish a Child in Need of Supervision Pilot Program in Baltimore City and County.

2007

- Victor Cullen Center reopened in July.
- Maryland Youth Residence Center closed in October.
- SB 359 Reorganization and Regionalization required DJS to serve youth with specified programming that delivered services on a regional basis.

2008

- Group Home Reform Keeping Maryland Youth in Maryland Per Diem Reduction Initiative.
- · Violence Prevention Initiative (VPI) began in Baltimore City in January and statewide in November.
- · Day/Evening Reporting Center opened in Prince George's County in November.
- SB 742 Provided that all contracted residential child care programs must post a "Residents' Bill of Rights" in the facility and provide residents and their parents/guardians a handbook of the policies of the provider.
- Thomas O'Farrell Youth Center closed in December.

2009

- Collaboration with Operation Safe Kids (OSK) to serve VPI youth in Baltimore City and Prince George's County.
- Silver Oak Academy opened as a private provider serving only DJS youth.

2010

- · Child Safety Net Dashboard launched in February.
- HB 1382 Allowed DJS to share juvenile information and collaborate with juvenile justice agencies in the District of Columbia and Virginia.

2011

- SB 62 Authorized the State Department of Education and the Department of Juvenile Services to share educational records when necessary to ensure the appropriate delivery of services.
- HB 1190 Expanded the Child in Need of Supervision Pilot Program to include Cecil, Montgomery, and Prince George's Counties.
- The committed female population moved from Thomas J.S. Waxter Facility to J. DeWeese Carter Center in November.
- CHALLENGE behavioral management program was implemented at Carter Center in November.



Juvenile Justice in Maryland - A Historical Evolution (continued)

2012

- SB 245 Allowed DJS to begin to develop a continuum of care by granting the agency the ability to move youth between committed placements.
- Central Review Committee was formed to implement the terms of SB 245 and commenced its operation in July.
- CHALLENGE was implemented at Victor Cullen Center in March, the Youth Centers in August, and William Donald Schaefer House in October.
- The Tier I Human Sex Trafficking Screening Tool was adopted at the Thomas J.S. Waxter Children's Center in March to screen for victims of human sex trafficking and was expanded to the Alfred D. Noyes Children's Center in December.

2013

- HB 245 Expanded DJS' ability to share juvenile information and collaborate with juvenile justice agencies in Delaware, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia.
- Silver Oak Academy received approval to increase their treatment capacity from 48 beds to 96 beds.
- MSDE completed assumption of responsibility for educating youth in all DJS facilities.
- Under-13 (U-13) Initiative commenced in Baltimore City in May.
- From March to May, over 56 training sessions were held where approximately 1,100 Department employees learned to recognize the signs of
 possible human sex trafficking victimization among youth involved in the juvenile justice system and apply appropriate responses to support
 possible victims.

2014

- The Department began screening for victims of human sex trafficking at the Charles H. Hickey Jr. School in March.
- The U-13 Initiative expanded to Prince George's County in May.

2015

- Crossover Youth Practice Model (CYPM) Initiative began in Prince George's County in April with the intention of expanding statewide over a
 multi-year implementation.
- Accountability Incentives Management (AIM) DJS Graduated Responses Initiative was implemented statewide in July.
- SB 172 Required eligible youth who were charged as adults and required detention to be held in juvenile detention facilities.
- Seven of the thirteen DJS-operated facilities were audited and earned 100% compliance with federal Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) standards.

2016

- DJS Re-entry Strategic Plan was approved in January.
- Offices of Family Engagement and Equity and Systems Reform was created in February.
- William Donald Schaefer House was closed on May 26, 2016.
- SB 245 Continuum of Care Legislation expired in June.
- VPI ended at the close of FY 2016.
- On November 17, 2016 the new Cheltenham Youth Detention Center opened with a capacity of 72 beds, replacing the 115-bed Cheltenham Youth Facility.
- The remaining six DJS-operated facilities not audited in 2015 were audited and earned 100% compliance with federal Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) standards.

2017

Behavioral Health Diversion Initiative (BHDI) pilot was implemented in Baltimore City and Wicomico County.

2018

Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) was implemented in DJS committed facilities in January. The CHALLENGE behavioral
management program was modified to be consistent with PBIS principles and renamed to STARR.



- Family Peer Support Program was implemented in September in Baltimore City and Prince George's, Baltimore, Anne Arundel, and Wicomico
 Counties to link youth and families involved in the juvenile justice system to community resources.
- After several months of construction, Savage Mountain Youth Center reopened as a hardware secure facility with enhanced educational and therapeutic programming.
- DJS began screening for victims of human sex trafficking at Baltimore City Juvenile Justice Center and Cheltenham Youth Detention Center.

2019


- American Correctional Association (ACA) national accreditation was awarded to Victor Cullen Center on January 12 and J. DeWeese Carter Center on August 3.
- HB 606 Established the Juvenile Justice Reform Council for two years.
- SB 704 Added DJS data and research and evaluation opportunities to the Maryland Longitudinal Data System.

2020

- J. De Weese Carter Youth Facility for females was closed on June 30, 2020. The population was moved to the new Mountain View program for females on the grounds of Backbone Mountain Youth Center. Mountain View officially opened on June 19, 2020.
- Meadow Mountain Youth Center closed on June 30, 2020.
- Savage Mountain Youth Center was renamed Garrett Children's Center June 3, 2020.
- COVID-19 Overview (see pages vi-vii for additional COVID information):
 - Governor Hogan declared a state of emergency and the existence of a catastrophic health emergency on March 3, 2020.
 - Governor Hogan moved Maryland to Elevated Level 2 pandemic response, which included telework for state employees on March 12, 2020.
 - On March 14, 2020, Savage Mountain Youth Center closed, youth were moved to Victor Cullen Center, and staff were reassigned to Victor Cullen and other youth centers. Savage Mountain Youth Center reopened in June under new name (noted above).
 - On March 16, 2020, Maryland courts suspended normal operations, with courthouses closed to the public and juvenile court operations limited to detention hearings and certain emergency matters.
 - On March 20, 2020 J. De Weese Carter Center temporarily closed, and youth were moved to the Lower Eastern Shore Children's Center. Carter Center was reopened in May (prior to its permanent closure on June 30, 2020 as noted above).
 - On June 5, 2020, the courts entered the first phase of a gradual return to full operations. This initial step added arrangements, hearings without witnesses, treatment plan reviews, and non-contested hearings to the list of authorized juvenile court matters. Contested matters including adjudications and transfer/waiver hearings resumed on July 20, with the juvenile court reaching fully operational status on August 31.



Flow of FY 2020 Case Referrals*





In FY 2020:

- There were a total of 14,913 juvenile complaints processed by DJS.
 - 38.9% (5,806) of those juvenile complaints were referred to the State's Attorney for the authorization of a formal petition (as opposed to being resolved at intake or youth receiving pre-court supervision).
- Of the 5,806 juvenile complaints referred to the State's Attorney, 86.8% (5,039) were petitioned and resulted in a court disposition. The remaining 13.2% includes 8.8% not petitioned (509), 3.7% denied by State's Attorney (216), 0.7% initial petition withdrawn (39), and 0.1% non est (3).
- Of the 5,039 court dispositions:
 - 22.1% (1,114) were pending disposition as of November 2020.
 - 26.3% (1,323) received probation and 10.0% (505) were committed to DJS.
 - The remaining 41.6% (2,097) included stet, jurisdiction waived to adult court, dismissed, closed, nolle prosequi, services not ordered, committed to other agency or "other". (See Intake & Community Supervision, Case Forwarding Decision and Court Action table for more detail.)
- Of the 505 committed court dispositions, there were 74.1% (374) committed admissions (248 distinct youth). The remaining 25.9% (131) include community commitments and youth who had already been in a committed placement prior to the new intake.
 - Of the 374 committed admissions, 48.4% (181) were admissions to DJS-operated facilities, while 51.6% (193) were admissions to non-DJS operated facilities. Of the 193 committed admissions to non-DJS operated facilities:
 - 42.5% (82) were group home admissions (including ICFA); 38.3% (74) were RTC admissions; and 9.8% (19) were Silver Oak Academy admissions.
 - The remaining 9.3% (18) were out-of-state, foster care, or independent living program admissions.

STEPS IN THE JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM (SEE PROCESS FLOWCHART)

- 1. Youth can be referred to DJS by law enforcement, schools, citizens, and parents. Some police departments run diversion programs, and only those youth who fail out of the program would be referred to DJS. Youth may also be apprehended by law enforcement agencies (on a writ or warrant) for failing to appear in court or violating the conditions of supervision while in an alternative to detention program, for example.
- 2. If requested by law enforcement, DJS makes an emergency detention decision to determine if a youth requires secure detention until the next court day. This decision is guided by a Detention Risk Assessment Instrument (DRAI).
- 3. The intake complaint is assessed by an intake officer, who has statutory authority to determine how the case should be handled. The options are:
 - Disapprove as legally insufficient refer to services as appropriate;
 - Resolve, when it is determined that furthering the case would be disadvantageous to the interests of the youth and to public safety. Referrals to services as appropriate;
 - Enter into a pre-court supervision agreement where the family agrees to certain conditions, including participation in treatment services as appropriate, without court involvement. This is the main DJS court diversion program; or
 - Formally authorize the State's Attorney to petition the juvenile court for a hearing.
- 4. At the detention hearing, the juvenile court determines if detention is required until the adjudicatory or dispositional hearing. Youth may also be detained directly by the juvenile court in cases where the youth is presented during court hours, either on a new charge, a writ or warrant, or due to a violation or sanction of a supervision order (probation, community detention, drug court, etc.). DJS operates all secure juvenile detention centers.
- 5. Youth who present a lower risk may also be supervised in programs providing alternatives to secure detention. These programs ensure that the youth is available to attend the adjudicatory hearing. Youth must comply with certain restrictions, which include house arrest, electronic monitoring, or day and/or evening reporting centers. Structured shelter is also used for cases where the youth cannot return home after arrest but otherwise represents a lower risk.
- **6.** DJS formally authorizes the State's Attorney to petition the juvenile court. The State's Attorney then reviews the complaint and may dismiss it or file a petition to the juvenile court.

- 7. At the adjudicatory hearing (a fact-finding hearing), the juvenile court determines the outcome of the petitioned charges, which can be sustained or not sustained.
- 8. While a youth is awaiting disposition and/or supervision or placement, DJS conducts a series of assessments and investigations which will guide the DJS recommendation to the court on how the case should be handled.
- 9. For cases where a charge is sustained, a disposition hearing is held to determine if the youth is delinquent. If the youth is found delinquent, the court determines whether the youth requires DJS supervision and treatment under a probation order or a commitment order. A commitment order usually indicates an out-of-home placement.
- **10.** Youth with a court-ordered disposition of probation receive supervision and services while they reside at home. Supervision intensity varies depending on the risk level of youth. Standard community supervision levels include low, moderate, high, and intensive supervision.
- 11. Youth with a court-ordered disposition of commitment who require placement in an out-of-home program may continue to wait in detention (pending placement) until an appropriate placement becomes available.
- **12.** Youth who are committed to an out-of-home placement may be placed in a broad variety of programs (state-run or private, secure or non-secure) depending on the risk level and treatment needs of the youth.
- 13. DJS has committed diversion programs for youth who might otherwise be placed out of home. These in-home programs provide services and treatment to the youth and family, and include Functional Family Therapy (FFT), Multisystemic Therapy (MST), and Family Centered Treatment (FCT).
- 14. Youth returning home from a committed placement are supervised on aftercare by DJS case managers who, along with regional re-entry specialists, ensure that youth are connected in the community with required services including education, employment, and health services.



Professional Training and Education Unit (PTEU)

The PTEU supports DJS by providing opportunities for staff to enhance their skill so that they are well equipped to effectively deliver services to youth in juvenile justice settings. The PTEU contributes to the agency's goal to build, value, and retain a diverse, competent, and professional workforce. PTEU delivers training for staff at all levels of the agency, for both PREA-mandated direct care staff and others, including Entry Level Training (ELT) for its newest employees, professional development for existing staff, and supervisor and management training for its emerging leaders. Training programs are designed to provide learning environments that encourage upward mobility, assisting staff to climb the ladder.



The **PTEU Certification Unit** is specialized in and familiar with the various certification processes under the Maryland Police and Correctional Training Commissions (MPCTC), and has a comprehensive understanding of the Code of Maryland Regulations (COMAR) and the American Correctional Association (ACA) training practices and performance-based standards. The Certification Unit ensures that all mandated DJS employees acquire and retain required certifications, tracks instructor certifications, maintains training records, and plays a critical role in the audit process to ensure the Department's compliance with COMAR, MPCTC, and ACA requirements.

During FY 2020, PTEU contributed to DJS' goal to enhance the quality, availability, and use of technology to improve services for staff, youth, and families by introducing the delivery of virtual "live" and self-paced online training to the Department. PTEU collaborated with various units within DJS to analyze, design, develop, implement, and evaluate numerous online training sessions designed for both mandated and non-mandated staff. As a result, online training is being added to the modes of training delivery offered by PTEU moving forward.



Training highlights during FY 2020:

- Collaborating with the Mental Health Association of MD to offer a 3-year certification course for Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA) and Adult Mental Health First Aid (AMHFA), which prepares staff to be the first responders of mental health crises in DJS facilities and community offices. DJS began training all direct care staff on YMHFA in 2015. To determine the effectiveness of this initiative, DJS staff were surveyed in 2017. Staff who responded to the survey noted using these techniques in a situation that was growing into a crisis 56% of the time as well as in crisis situations 25% of the time. Many staff noted using YMHFA in their personal lives as well as in work including responding to individuals who were actively suicidal. The results of the survey were published in 2020 in the Juvenile and Family Court Journal 71, No. 1.
- Partnering with the American Federation of State, County & Municipal Employees (AFSCME) to deliver "Workplace Violence Prevention: Elements of a Comprehensive Workplace Violence Prevention Plan" training to DJS' leadership, instructors, and staff. This training is designed to raise awareness of known hazards and risk factors as they relate to workplace violence, teach about the five core elements of a comprehensive workplace violence prevention plan, and provide information on conducting a worksite analysis as well as hazard prevention and control.
- Collaborating with the Behavioral Health Unit to bring cutting edge behavioral management programs to DJS such as Trauma Informed Care (TIC) and Positive Behavioral Interventions & Supports (PBIS), CHALLENGE and STARR training. PTEU assisted in the planning for implementation of the National Child Traumatic Stress Network's (NCTSN) Think Trauma curriculum, Positive Youth Development (PYD), and the Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) training programs.





Section II: Intake and Community Supervision

Introduction to Intake and Community Supervision

The Department provides a continuum of services to youth in the community across multiple stages of the juvenile justice system. Youth enter the system at the point of intake. At this stage, DJS intake officers receive complaints from persons or agencies (e.g. private citizens, schools, victims, or law enforcement agencies) and assess whether the juvenile court has jurisdiction and whether judicial action is warranted. Community Services staff supervise DJS-involved youth who have been placed on Informal (or Pre-Court) supervision, Community Detention and electronic monitoring (CD/EM), probation, and aftercare supervision. Case supervision and management tasks will be described in more detail below.

Pre-Adjudication Services

The DJS Pre-Adjudication Services unit oversees statewide Intake and Community Detention Operations. The Intake unit is responsible for managing and monitoring a uniform statewide approach for the review of intake complaints, as well as ensuring that appropriate assessments and reviews are conducted and that service referrals are made to promote the best interest of the child and public safety. Community Detention Operations oversees programs that serve as alternatives to secure detention for youth who have allegedly committed a new offense and are pending adjudication. These alternatives to detention (ATD) programs include:

- Community Detention/Electronic Monitoring (CD/EM),
- GPS Monitoring,
- Baltimore City Evening Reporting Center, and
- Prince George's Evening Reporting Center.

Reform Efforts

Intake decisions must be fair and equitable, acknowledging that systemic racism, biases, and prejudices can influence which youth are referred to DJS intake. In 2017, the Department began revising its policies and procedures to integrate best practices in the juvenile justice field in conjunction with lessons learned based on data analysis and the experiences of youth who present at DJS intake. Specifically, the Department partnered with the University of Maryland, School of Social Work to develop a validated, objective intake decision tool that would identify a youth's risk of recidivism, strengths, and service needs. This new tool, implemented in July 2020, is intended to ensure fair and equitable decisions that are developmentally appropriate, culturally proficient, and tailored to the risks, needs, and strengths of youth. Throughout the intake process, the focus is on positive youth development (recognizing and building on the strengths and assets of youth) and family engagement (actively involving the youth and family voice in all aspects of case planning) – both of which promote successful outcomes. Supported by the tool, the Department aims to divert youth from court involvement when possible and refer the youth and family to services when needed, including high-risk youth who may be safely supervised by DJS with interventions that reduce the risk of recidivism.

Intake

Intake officers review all delinquent and Child in Need of Supervision (CINS) complaints, citations, referrals for service, and peace order requests. Intake officers are directed to make a determination within 25 days as to whether the juvenile court has jurisdiction, and whether judicial action is in the best interest of the public or the child. DJS intake officers are authorized to either: (a) disapprove a complaint as legally insufficient; (b) resolve the matter at intake with or without services; (c) propose an informal adjustment period (also called pre-court supervision); or (d) authorize the filing of a petition by the State's Attorney's Office. DJS is required to forward all felony

and handgun violation complaints to the State's Attorney's Office for review. The intake decision-making process may involve an interview with the youth, parent and/or guardian, and where applicable, the victim(s).

The intake decision is guided by the new Intake Decision Tool (see Appendix M). This tool includes a newly validated version of the MCASP Intake Risk Screen, the tool used by the Department to guide intake decisions between 2010 and 2019. The validated risk screen incorporated into the new Intake Decision Tool generates a risk score which measures the risk of reoffending. Importantly, the new Intake Decision Tool collects detailed information on social history factors, e.g., school, use of free time, employment, relationships in the community, and family that is used to identify service needs and prompt the appropriate service referrals. The new tool also requires that the intake officer consider any aggravating and mitigating factors as well as any service access considerations that may be a barrier to obtaining services.

In addition to assessing the merit of complaints received at intake and making the case forwarding decision, DJS intake officers are responsible for determining whether youth who have been taken into custody require secure detention or may be released to a parent, guardian, or other responsible adult and, if so, under what conditions. Some youth are released to a caregiver without any additional restrictions or conditions. Other youth are released to a caregiver and required to participate in an alternative to detention (ATD) program such as Community Detention, ERC, or a Shelter pending their court hearing on the next court date.

Intake officers are directed by statute (Md. Code, Courts and Judicial Proceedings, section 3-8A-15) to authorize detention if detention is deemed necessary to protect the youth or others, or if the youth is deemed likely to leave the jurisdiction of the court. Shelter care may be utilized for youth requiring care, but not in a secure setting. Additionally, shelter care can be utilized if a parent, guardian, or custodian is not available to provide supervision and care until the youth returns to court.

The decision to authorize detention is guided by a decision-making tool called the Detention Risk Assessment Instrument (DRAI). The DRAI is designed to provide an objective assessment of the probability that a youth will reoffend or fail to appear for future court dates. The DRAI was most recently validated in FY 2017 and implemented in July 2017 (see Appendix F).

Intake services are provided by the DJS regions during normal working hours (i.e., Monday-Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.). The Baltimore City Region provides 24/7 intake services and houses a centralized intake unit at the Baltimore City Juvenile Justice Center that provides statewide intake services during non-traditional work hours and/or holidays for all regions across the state.

Pre-Adjudication Services – Pre-Court Supervision (Informal Adjustment)

As discussed in the previous section, one option for a case received at DJS intake is to handle the case informally without involving the juvenile court through an informal adjustment option called Pre-Court supervision. This is conducted under an agreement executed by the DJS intake officer that stipulates conditions of the supervision period, and requires consent by the youth, parent/guardian, and victim (where applicable). Approval by the State's Attorney's Office is required if the case involves a felony offense. Pre-Court agreements are tailored to the individual circumstances of the case, and may include the payment of restitution, the completion of community service hours,



as well as participation in specialized community-based services and counseling or treatment programs such as substance abuse treatment. Agreements are generally in effect for a period of 90 days, however, in some circumstances the period may be extended to 180 days to allow for the youth to participate in a substance abuse or mental health treatment program. If a youth fails to meet the conditions of the agreement, the DJS intake officer may elect to forward the case to the State's Attorney's Office for review.

Pre-Adjudication Services – Community Detention

DJS provides regional Community Detention services, with or without electronic monitoring, typically for youth whose cases have been forwarded to the juvenile court at intake. The program operates 24/7 and serves as the primary ATD. Community Detention allows youth to continue participating in community activities such as school or work, and helps maintain community ties and support systems.

Community Detention supervision includes face-to-face and telephone contacts, as well as random unannounced visits at home, school, and work. The level of supervision depends on the assessed supervision needs of each youth and the court-ordered release conditions. Community Detention Officers (CDOs) are trained to monitor violations of court-ordered release conditions and to report any changes in a youth's home or school situation. CDO's work closely with the youth and family to ensure compliance with the program and intervene in accordance with the Departments AIM guidelines when addressing Community Detention violations. Youth who violate the conditions of release may be withdrawn from the program and placed in secure detention.

The electronic monitoring component provides an additional layer of supervision. Compliance with the program is monitored electronically using an ankle bracelet worn by the youth and a receiver located in the youth's home. All electronic notifications related to the youth's schedule and equipment functionality are received in real time. The Command Center and assigned CDO carefully review the information to ensure that supervision violations receive proper intervention and follow-up. The Command Center is located in Baltimore City. This centrally-operated command center post provides 24/7 staffing.

Post-Adjudication Services

The DJS Community Supervision unit consists of 30 local offices throughout the state that oversees the case management operations for youth under court-ordered probation and aftercare services. Community Services also includes the Resource Units, which assist in facilitating in-home and out-of-home committed treatment services

for youth. After a youth is adjudicated, efforts continue to be made to divert youth from the deep end of the system by focusing on community-based treatment rather than out-of- home committed care. When youth are being evaluated for services as part of a pre-disposition social history investigation, or by a Multidisciplinary Assessment Staffing Team (MAST), a community treatment plan is part of the review to ensure that only the most at-risk youth receive residential treatment. After disposition, DJS case managers will regularly review youth's progress and length of stay on probation, in placement, or on aftercare to ensure services are being delivered and are successful in moving the youth towards successful closure. DJS is moving towards a system of continuous case management, where - to the extent possible- a youth's case will be assigned to and managed by the same case manager for the duration of supervision.

MAST is a specialized diagnostic team responsible for assessing youth detained pending court disposition and at risk of placement. The MAST includes a psychologist, social worker or professional counselor, substance abuse counselor, community case manager, detention facility case manager supervisor, resource specialist, and a Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) representative. Following completion of assessments, a MAST or community staffing meeting is held which includes the participation of youth and family. An in-depth review of the case information is completed during the meeting, and the team develops and submits a report for the juvenile court to consider at disposition, which includes both security and treatment recommendations.

Probation

Youth who are adjudicated and found delinquent by the juvenile court may be placed on probation under the supervision of a DJS case management specialist (CMS). Probation is the most frequently used juvenile court disposition. A probation term requires youth to abide by general supervision conditions, as well as any special conditions imposed by the court. At the start of probation supervision (or in some instances, prior to disposition if ordered by the juvenile court), a Social History Investigation and report are completed by the assigned CMS. This report describes the social adjustment and circumstances of the youth and their family. The CMS also completes the MCASP Needs Assessment that includes components of the MCASP Intake Risk Screen, but provides a much broader and more comprehensive assessment of individual risk, needs, and strengths. The MCASP Needs Assessment categorizes youth as having either low, moderate, or high need on each of the following treatment domains (which have been shown to influence risk for reoffending): (a) School; (b) Use of Free Time; (c) Employment; (d) Community Relationships; (e) Family;

(f) Alcohol and Drugs; (g) Mental Health; and (h) Attitudes and Aggression. See Appendix N for a list of MCASP Needs Assessment items.

The CMS uses the Social History Investigation and MCASP Needs Assessment to develop recommendations to the juvenile court and to create a Treatment Service Plan (TSP). A TSP is completed for each youth under court-ordered supervision and includes the recommended supervision level for the youth, specific goals for the youth and family to meet, and a statement of services to be provided to the youth and family. In developing the TSP, input from youth, parents and/or guardians, and service providers (as appropriate) is also solicited

Aftercare and Re-entry

Aftercare supervision is similar to probation supervision in that the CMS performs many of the same supervisory tasks and relies on the same decision-making tools (e.g., the MCASP Needs Assessment). Aftercare services are provided for youth who have been committed to or released from the custody of DJS for placement outside the home, or for the receipt of in-home services in some jurisdictions. A CMS is assigned to the case upon commitment. Aftercare planning is initiated at commitment, before the youth is placed in a residential program. Plans are guided by risk and needs assessments, are updated according to youth's progress in residential care, and also include identification and monitoring of services needed upon release. Building on services provided in the residential placement, the CMS is also responsible for managing the re-entry process so youth and family are linked to services, and possible continuation of treatment in the community. Youth's adjustment and compliance with any court directives is monitored. Additionally, a variety of programs is available to assist youth returning to the community; including independent living programs, transitional educational services, and employment programs (e.g., job readiness training, career exploration, and vocational training). As a step-down to community supervision, some youth are also monitored with GPS supervision. GPS may also be ordered by the court, or as a sanction by a case manager for high-risk cases, and for youth on home passes from secure placement.

Accountability Incentives Management (AIM)

Instituted in 2015, the AIM initiative gives DJS case managers a structured system of graduated responses to deter negative behaviors and encourage positive behaviors of youth under court-ordered community supervision. AIM seeks to reduce technical violations of Community Detention, probation, or aftercare supervision by ensuring certain, fair, and immediate responses to youth behavior that promote successful completion of supervision.



Interstate Compact (IC) Unit

The IC unit provides for the cooperative supervision of probation and aftercare youth who move from state to state as well as the return of runaways, absconders, and escapees. A new compact which includes all 50 states was enacted in 2014 forming the Interstate Commission for Juveniles (ICJ). This Commission governs each member state as to the provision of proper supervision or return of delinquent youth and status offenders on probation or aftercare who have absconded, escaped, or run away and, in so doing, have endangered their own safety or the safety of others. It is the responsibility of each member state to provide supervision and services to ICJ cases using the same standards that prevail for its own youth placed on probation or aftercare supervision.


Note to Readers:

- 1. Like actions are grouped together. For example: "Petition Withdrawn, Denied by SAO, and Non Est" all represent cases that did not proceed to court, and "Dismissed, Closed, Nolle Pros" cases went to court, but did not make it to an adjudicatory decision.
- 2. In cases with more than one result (e.g. Continued then Dismissed), the ultimate action is now shown for all cases, (as of the time of data extraction.) Previously, the first action was shown for most cases, except for Continued/Stet.









































































Pre-Court Supervision

Pre-court supervision in Maryland is a statewide program that serves to divert youth from formal juvenile court processing. Also referred to as "informal adjustment," it is a way of holding youth accountable for their actions while avoiding formal processing in the courts. Pre-court supervision can be proposed by a DJS intake officer in a case when it is determined that the juvenile court has jurisdiction, but it would be in the best interests of the public and the youth to handle the complaint without judicial action. Youth referred for less serious offenses and with a lower risk of recidivism are those more likely to be handled informally. A pre-court supervision agreement is a contract unique to the case that outlines the purpose, proposed length, conditions of behavior, and services to be accessed. The parties agree to participate and intake staff provides support to ensure that youth and families can access services where applicable (approval by the State's Attorney is required for a felony offense). Conditions may include short-term participation in an Evening Reporting Center (ERC) program (for first-time, serious offenders), participation in Multi-Systems Therapy (MST) or Functional Family Therapy (FFT), referrals to Maryland Coalition of Families (MCF) to work with a family peer support specialist, Neighborhood Youth Panels, teen court, paying restitution, completing community service, or specialized substance abuse/mental health counseling or treatment programs.

The pre-court supervision period is usually less than 90 days, but may be extended to 180 days if a youth is required to participate in a program. The victim, the youth, and the youth's parent/guardian must all consent to the arrangement. If the victim does not consent, the pre-court supervision term cannot proceed. The case may then be closed or forwarded to the State's Attorney's Office for formal processing; victims may appeal to the State's Attorney if the case is closed. Parties may also withdraw support for the pre-court agreement at any time, though this is rare. If the conditions of the agreement are met, the case is generally closed. If terms are not successfully met, the case may be sent to the State's Attorney for formal processing or closed. All parties to the agreement and the arresting officer are informed about the failure to complete the terms, and the subsequent decision about the case, and all have a right to appeal.

- Overall placements to pre-court supervision deceased 32.0% between FY 2018 and FY 2020 and decreased 31.0% from FY 2019 to FY 2020.
- The Metro Region comprised over one quarter of placements to pre-court supervision in all three reported fiscal years.
- Offense Category (FY 2019-2020):
 - The percentage of Crimes of Violence increased from 6.6% to 9.4%.
 - The percentage of Felonies increased from 7.2% to 8.9%.
 - The percentage of Misdemeanors increased from 71.2% to 73.0%.
 - Misdemeanors comprised nearly three-quarters of all alleged offenses for youth placed on pre-court supervision.

 - More than half of youth released from pre-court supervision had a LOS of 61-90 days.







JUVENILE COMPLAINTS TOTAL AND BY SEX FY 2011-2020




• Juvenile complaints decreased 58.4% between FY 2011 and FY 2020. Both sexes saw a decrease between FY 2011 and FY 2020 and the percent reduction was similar for males and females (59.8% for males and 54.7% for females).





• Between FY 2011 and FY 2020, juvenile complaints decreased for all races/ethnicities: Blacks (55.6%), Whites (66.2%), and youth of other races/ethnicities including Hispanic youth (41.4%).










DETAINED AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION (ADP) FY 2011-2020





Pre-Disposition ADP has consistently been higher than Pending Placement ADP and both groups saw a decrease between FY 2011 and FY 2020 (62.7% decrease for Pre-Disposition and 74.9% for Pending Placement). The population of youth charged as adults began being tracked in FY 2014 and ADP increased 191.5% between FY 2014 and FY 2020.

DJS SUPERVISED YOUTH FY 2011-2020




Long-Term Trends (cont.) COMMITTED PLACEMENTS BY RISK LEVEL¹ FY 2011-2020

Introduction to Detention

DJS operates seven detention facilities across the State to provide temporary and secure custody of youth subject to court jurisdiction. Youth may be detained at various points in the juvenile justice system. The juvenile court may order detention for youth pending a court hearing (pre- or post-disposition), pending initial placement in a committed program, or pending placement in a committed program post-ejection. Youth are most commonly detained for new complaints alleging delinquent behavior, writs and warrants issued by the court, or violations of alternative to detention (ATD) program conditions. Note that youth pending adult criminal charges may also be held in DJS detention facilitites while the transfer of jurisdiction from adult to juvenile court is being considered (see "Youth Charged as Adults Pending Transfer" on page 126).

DETENTION PROCESS

The decision whether to detain a youth is driven primarily by the juvenile court. However, juvenile detention may be authorized by DJS intake officers on a temporary basis at the request of a law enforcement officer or community detention officer. DJS is empowered by statute to detain a youth who either poses a clear risk to themselves/ others, or is deemed likely to leave court jurisdiction. This emergent decision is guided by the Detention Risk Assessment Instrument (DRAI) (see Appendix F) and is subject to court review on the next court day. The DRAI objectively informs detention decisions by taking into account three factors:

admissions officer interviews youth to collect and verify basic identifying information. The admissions officer also performs a search of the DJS information system, ASSIST, to obtain available information on a youth's delinquency and placement history. A photograph of each youth is taken and included in the case record for identification purposes. The rules of the detention facility, including the grievance procedure, are provided to each youth in the facility handbook. Youth are issued clothing to wear in the facility. Personal clothing is cleaned, catalogued, packaged, and placed in secure storage.


- (1) the assessed risk that a youth will reoffend or fail to appear for a court hearing, based on known risk factors in the youth's history;
- (2) the seriousness of the current alleged offense; and
- (3) other factors that require DJS to temporarily detain a youth regardless of risk or offense seriousness, including an outstanding writ, warrant, or interstate hold.

Based on these three factors, the DRAI recommends either release, placement in an ATD, or detention. The DRAI is a key tool for the Department to ensure fair and evidence-based decision making regarding the use of secure detention.

DETENTION ADMISSIONS

Each detention facility operates an admissions area 24 hours a day where all youth admitted to detention are processed. An

The admissions process includes an initial health screening. It is performed by admissions nursing staff and consists of a review of physical health, mental health, and substance abuse needs. A full medical history and physical examination is conducted by a licensed physician or nurse practitioner within seven days of admission. In addition, youth receive preventative care by a dentist or dental trained personnel within 14 calendar days of admission. (See page vi for a description of the Department's response to the COVID-19 crisis, which involves further screening and special processing.)

DETENTION CASE MANAGEMENT

Youth who are detained by the juvenile court are assigned a DJS community case manager and a facility case manager. The community case manager visits the youth in detention, interviews the youth and family, and completes required investigations and/or assessments, e.g., a Social History Investigation or MCASP Needs Assessment (see Appendix N). The facility case manager acts as a liaison with the court, family, community case manager, and treatment service providers while the youth is in detention. The facility case manager also assists youth with understanding facility rules and procedures and the behavior management system upon admission to the facility. They facilitate individual meetings, weekly groups, activities and answer any questions the youth may have. They monitor youth progress and compliance with the behavior management system and may provide information and input for the Multidisciplinary Assessment Staffing Team meetings.

Services Provided in Detention Facilities

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES

DIS Behavioral Health Services (BHS) is responsible for establishing and implementing policies governing the delivery of mental health, substance abuse, and evidencebased treatment services to youth under DJS supervision. BHS maintains a staff of licensed, certified counselors and

contractors to provide complete assessments and necessary services. BHS provides integrated mental health and substance use disorder screening, assessments, and short-term crisis services in DJS detention facilities.

Upon admission to a detention center, each youth is screened by a qualified mental health professional. The screening consists

of an interview, the administration of tests as appropriate, and the review of any prior

assessments or records (e.g., psychosocial or clinical assessments). If the initial mental health screen reveals mental health concerns, recommendations are made for more indepth assessments or additional services. These assessments, conducted by psychiatrists or licensed psychologists,

examine the emotional, adaptive, and cognitive functioning of detained youth with greater mental health issues.

Additionally, certified addictions counselors screen and assess youth in detention and determine appropriate levels of substance abuse treatment needs. This information assists case managers in linking youth with appropriate community and residential services. Addictions counselors work closely with the Department's medical director for those youth requiring medication management as a result of their drug addiction.

EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

The Maryland State Department of Education's (MSDE) Juvenile Services Education System (JSES) provides educational programming to youth in DJS detention facilities consistent with the requirements of the Code of Maryland Regulations (COMAR), Title 13A. The program includes instruction in core content subjects, Career and Technology Education, library/media services, life skills, and special education services. Students are pre-tested upon entry to the JSES program to assess baseline academic skills. Teachers use the results to design learning plans for each student which form the basis of daily instruction. After each 30-day period of enrollment, the student is retested to determine academic gains.

Students in a JSES program can earn credit toward the Maryland High School Diploma which they may receive upon return to their home high school. Alternately, some students are enrolled in classes designed to prepare them to take their GED examination. DJS educational Transition Specialists assist youth who are detained for more than five days with re-enrollment in their local school. They obtain records from the facility, and forward them to the local school's Pupil Personnel Worker (PPW), Registrar and to the assigned DJS community case manager. In some counties, the case manager and Education Liaison assist with the process. The Transition Specialist then follows up with the assigned school for the youth's enrollment date.

RECREATIONAL SERVICES

Structured recreation programs are available to all youth in detention. The recreation program provides a variety of activities promoting physical health and wellness. Youth are required to participate in recreational activities for a minimum of one hour per day.

Pending Placement

by the juvenile court. Youth detained post-disposition are considered to be 'pending placement' as they are waiting to be admitted or placed into an out-of-home committed treatment program.


Youth who are pending placement receive the same core services as youth detained prior to disposition, including educational services, screening, evaluation, and treatment for substance abuse, mental health, and somatic health (including dietary and dental).

Youth receive biweekly visits from their community case manager. Each facility also allows family visitation during the week or on weekends (the visitation schedule varies by facility).

A review hearing is held in accordance with Md. Code and Judicial Proceedings, 3-8A-15(k) for any youth in detention 25 days after the court has made a disposition. At the hearing, DJS is required to explain the reasons for continued detention. The court will continue to conduct a hearing every 25 days thereafter until a youth has been placed.

During the pending placement period, the community case manager maintains contact with the youth's family and is also responsible for reporting to the juvenile court regarding the youth's placement status. In addition to court review, pending placement cases are reviewed by the Department on a weekly basis at facility management meetings. Regional-level meetings are held on a monthly basis to review placement statistics and identify barriers to placement and ways to expedite the process.

Pending Placement After Ejection from a Committed Program

Some youth committed to the custody of the Department cannot be safely maintained in their program and must be ejected. Youth ejected from a committed program who require a new committed placement are often placed in detention. Those with a new offense would be considered Pre-Disposition (Pre-D).

While detained pending a new placement, the Department's Central Review Committee (CRC) re-evaluates the youth's case and works to secure acceptance to the most appropriate alternative program. Youth ultimately placed in a DJS-operated program are transferred within 7 days of the CRC decision, provided there is available bed space.


Population Projections

Each year DJS produces a projection of Maryland's detention population using a set of statistical techniques known as time-series forecasting. Time-series forecasting assumes that there is a pattern in the historical values that can be identified. The goal is to define the pattern, understand the short-term and long-term trends, and pinpoint any seasonal fluctuations. Time-series forecasting then utilizes the pattern, trend, and seasonal variation identified in the historical data to project future values. Unless a future change is explicitly accounted

for, such models implicitly assume that current policies and practices will continue into the future. Future changes in policies, practices, or other critical factors can impact the future population and often cannot be anticipated. Many factors can have an impact on the number of youth admitted to the State's detention facilities and, thus, on the size of the detention population. Demographic shifts, trends in crime rates, the volume and patterns of arrests, and the number and types of incidents referred to the juvenile justice system each contribute to changes in the number of youth who are detained.

The projections were generated from all historical data available at the time that they were produced. Projection models were selected


based on rigorous statistical testing and the best fit to the historical data. The information is designed to be a tool for policymakers and practitioners, and can be useful for discussions pertaining to budgeting, operations, capacity planning, and development of services, including alternatives to detention for Maryland's youth.

A Note to Readers:

Placements versus Admissions: A placement is based on a decision made by an intake officer or judge to place a youth into detention. An admission occurs when a youth physically enters a facility either through direct placement or through transfer. Therefore, during one placement, a youth may have several admissions and these counts will not match.

DJS Secure Detention Facilities by Region







DJS operates seven detention facilities across Maryland. Each facility accommodates youth awaiting juvenile court disposition (Pre-D) and youth committed to DJS by the juvenile court and pending placement in a residential program (Post-D). The ejection population represents youth returned to detention following removal from a committed residential program, who have no new offenses requiring court processing and who need a new committed placement. Youth with pending adult criminal charges may also be held in DJS detention facilities (see pages 126-127 for more detail). These youth are included in the data presented except for demographic, offense, and risk level tables/charts.





ADP* BY PLACEMENT TYPE, FY 2018-2020








DJS operates three detention facilities that serve girls: Alfred D. Noyes Children's Center (co-ed), Lower Eastern Shore Children's Center (co-ed), and Thomas J.S. Waxter Children's Center. Some youth are detained awaiting disposition (Pre-D), and other youth are post-disposition (Post-D) awaiting placement in a committed program. The ejection population represents youth returned to detention following removal from a committed residential program, who have no new offenses requiring court processing, and who need a new committed placement. Data presented include youth charged as adults pending transfer (see pages 126-127 for more detail), except for demographic, offense, and risk level tables/charts.






ADP* BY PLACEMENT TYPE, FY 2018-2020



Under Age 13 Statewide Activity for Detention Centers


Youth under 13 who are detained by the court represent very few of the youth in DJS detention centers. Rather than placing these youth in a detention facility, DJS most frequently uses an alternative to detention (ATD) with placement at home or in a shelter. However, if a youth must be in a detention center they are housed with youth closest in age and size. If deemed highly vulnerable they may be placed in the infirmary, with one-on-one staff supervision or sent to a smaller facility with a lower population. Wherever placed, youth under 13 receive all the same services as other detained youth. *Note: youth under age 13 are not eligible to be charged in adult court.*





ADP* BY PLACEMENT TYPE, FY 2018-2020











ADP* BY PLACEMENT TYPE, FY 2018-2020





Youth Charged as Adults Pending Transfer

Youth ages 17 and under who are charged with a crime excluded from juvenile court jurisdiction may be held in adult detention centers pending trial. If ordered by the court, youth charged as adults who are eligible to file for transfer of charges to juvenile court may be held in a secure juvenile detention facility pending a transfer hearing to determine if jurisdiction should remain in the adult court or be transferred to the juvenile court. (Md. Code, Criminal Procedure, §4-202). Although DJS had previously entered into agreements with local criminal justice agencies to house such youth, the statute was amended effective October 1, 2015 requiring a youth charged as adult who is eligible for transfer to the juvenile court to be held in a secure juvenile detention facility pending that transfer decision unless: (1) the youth is released; (2) there is no capacity in the secure juvenile facility; or (3) the court finds that detention in a secure juvenile facility would pose a risk of harm to the child or others, and states the reasons for the finding on the record. Data in this section represent those youth held in DJS detention facilities for the adult court pending a transfer hearing. This section also provides information on youth whose complaints were transferred to the juvenile court, though they may or may not have been detained during the report year.





ADP* BY ADMISSION TYPE, FY 2018-2020







ADP BY ADMISSION TYPE, FY 2018-2020




PRE-D PLACEMENTS BY RISK LEVEL FOR YOUTH WITH A COMPLETED DRAI*, FY 2018-2020





ADP BY ADMISSION TYPE, FY 2018-2020




PRE-D PLACEMENTS BY RISK LEVEL FOR YOUTH WITH A COMPLETED DRAI*, FY 2018-2020

ADP BY ADMISSION TYPE, FY 2018-2020




PRE-D PLACEMENTS BY RISK LEVEL FOR YOUTH WITH A COMPLETED DRAI*, FY 2018-2020

ADP BY ADMISSION TYPE, FY 2018-2020




PRE-D PLACEMENTS BY RISK LEVEL FOR YOUTH WITH A COMPLETED DRAI*, FY 2018-2020





ADP BY ADMISSION TYPE, FY 2018-2020




PRE-D PLACEMENTS BY RISK LEVEL FOR YOUTH WITH A COMPLETED DRAI*, FY 2018-2020



ADP BY ADMISSION TYPE, FY 2018-2020




PRE-D PLACEMENTS BY RISK LEVEL FOR YOUTH WITH A COMPLETED DRAI*, FY 2018-2020

Alternatives to Detention (ATD)

DJS has a variety of programs designed to safely supervise youth in the community as an alternative to detention. ATDs include Community Detention (CD) - with or without Electronic/GPS Monitoring (EM), and Evening Reporting Centers (ERC) both serving females and males. In addition, DJS collaborates with private programs to provide additional ERC programming. These ERC programs include the Pre-Adjudication Coordination and Transition Center (PACT) for Baltimore City males, and Hearts and Homes for Youth, Inc., for males in Montgomery County. Shelter beds may also serve as an ATD in circumstances where release-eligible youth are unable to return home. ATD programs are used either by DJS intake staff for medium-risk youth presented for detention (placements must be reviewed by the juvenile court the next court day) or by the juvenile court directly. These alternatives allow youth to continue with school or work and maintain community ties, support systems, or alternative care. Youth on ATD supervision are expected to appear for scheduled hearings and not have any new arrests.





Introduction to Committed Programs

DJS' Community Operations Division is responsible for selecting the most appropriate out-of-home placement for youth who have been committed to the custody of DIS by the juvenile court. The Court makes a determination regarding the appropriate level of care for each youth but does not determine the specific program to which the youth is referred. Program placements vary based on the treatment services provided, as well as by security level.

DJS has made significant reform efforts, which include an increased focus on several key principles to guide decision making regarding out-of-home placements. These principles are:

- Utilize community-based treatment whenever possible;
- Utilize lengths of stay that maximize treatment benefits;
- Utilize evidence-based programs and programming;
- Prioritize out-of-home placements in Qualified Residential Treatment Programs (QRTP);
- Identify trauma, and provide trauma responsive care and treatment;
- Reduce racial and other systemic biases;
- Utilize a restorative approach seek options to repair harm to victims and communities; and
- Foster positive youth development and resiliency.

PLACEMENT PROCESS

The DJS placement process is designed to select the most appropriate program and treatment services for youth. The process begins after adjudication with a comprehensive case review of each youth. For youth in the community at the time of adjudication, the staffing is conducted in the local DIS office. For detained youth, a MAST staffing takes place in the detention center (see description below).

Community Staffing: A community staffing meeting is held to bring together key parties responsible for treatment service planning to include parents and/or guardians. At the staffing meeting, all pertinent information is considered, including the

Risk Levels Updated

On July 1, 2019, DJS rolled out an updated MCASP Risk and Needs assessment tool. Based on a validation study conducted by the Institute for Innovation and Implementation, at the University of Maryland (https://theinstitute.umaryland.edu), the updated tool better identifies those youth with higher risk of recidivating. Risk is now also categorized into four levels, with a "very high" level added to designate youth at the highest risk, and with the greatest need for intervention.

current offense(s), delinquency history, social history, MCASP recommended supervision level, MCASP assessment of treatment needs, educational records, any behavioral health and medical assessments, and the involvement of any other state agency.

Multidisciplinary Assessment Staffing Team (MAST):

MAST is a specialized diagnostic team responsible for assessing youth who are detained pending court disposition and are at risk of out-of-home placement. The MAST includes a psychologist, social worker or professional counselor, substance abuse counselor, community case manager, detention facility case manager supervisor, resource specialist, and a Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) representative. Youth who require more specialized assessments (e.g., a neurological, psycho-sexual, or medical assessment) are referred for evaluation, and the results are presented during a MAST staffing.

Referral for Services: Each staffing meeting culminates with recommendations to the juvenile court for program participation and/or treatment services tailored to the circumstances of each youth. After court disposition, DJS refers each case to the recommended program(s) for consideration.

DJS contracts with an array of programs, both in and out-ofstate, to provide services to committed youth. Programs may either accept or reject an applicant based on program eligibility criteria or capacity.

The full range of DJS placement options include: (a) Foster Care Homes (traditional and treatment foster care); (b) Group Homes (general service and therapeutic); (c) Independent Living Programs/Alternative Living Units (often used as a step-down from a more restrictive program placement); (d) Residential Treatment Centers (RTCs) and non-Medicaid Residential Treatment Facilities (out-of-state); (e) DJS-operated and out-of-state staff secure behavioral programs; and (g) hardware-secure treatment programs, both DJS-operated and privately contracted out-of-state.

The Department has established three levels of residential program placements based largely on the level of program restrictiveness (see the figure below). Level I includes all programs where youth reside in a community setting and attend community schools. Level II includes programs where education is provided on-grounds and youth movement is restricted primarily by staff monitoring and supervision. Level III programs provide the highest level of security by augmenting staff supervision with physical attributes of the facility, i.e., locked areas and fences.

- Traditional Foster Care, Treatment Foster Care
- Group Home, Therapeutic Group Home
- Alternative Living Unit
- Independent Living

Level II -Staff Secure Residential

- Group Home, Therapeutic Group Home with on-grounds School
- Intermediate Care Facility for Addictions
- Residential Treatment Center (Medicaid)
- Non-Medicaid Residential Treatment Facility
- Behavioral Program (e.g., Youth Center)

Level III -Hardware Secure Residential

- Residential Treatment Facility (Medicaid)
- Non-Medicaid Residential Treatment Facility
- Hardware Secure Behavioral Programs

Case Reviews: DJS' case management team conducts monthly reviews of all youth under the supervision of the Department to ensure that youth are receiving recommended services and appropriate supervision. Beginning in March 2020, DJS implemented a monthly executive-level case review to further ensure that youth are progressing in programs, receiving needed services while in a program, and being evaluated for court in a timely manner. This is in addition to the already established Central Review Committee process.

Central Review Committee (CRC): The initial committed program placement may not be successful for a number of reasons. Some youth may run away from their placement or are ejected due to misbehavior. Additionally, the behavioral, emotional, and/or medical needs of the youth may change. To handle these cases, DJS established the CRC. Chaired by the Director of Behavioral Health, the CRC conducts weekly case reviews of youth who are at risk of removal from a committed residential placement; directs changes in the provision of services; and makes placement transfer recommendations. The CRC was originally established by DJS in 2012, after legislation was passed granting DJS the authority to transfer youth to a higher security level without first requesting the court to modify the commitment order. That legislation expired in 2016; however, the CRC continues to meet regularly to manage the department's ejection cases, and requests for court order modification are made in those cases requiring increased security.

Services Provided in DJS-Operated Committed Programs

Youth served in a DJS-operated committed program receive a multitude of services, including behavioral health, somatic health, and educational services.


BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES

DJS Behavioral Health Services (BHS) provides integrated mental health and substance abuse treatment in DJS-operated, committed programs. Behavioral Health Services include: substance abuse services, suicide assessment and prevention, crisis intervention and stabilization, medication evaluation and monitoring, individual and group therapy, and family therapy when appropriate. In addition, all youth receive TAMAR-Y (Trauma, Addiction, Mental Health, and Recovery – Youth), which combines psychoeducation with cognitive behavioral interventions and expressive art therapy. START (Social Skills Training and Aggression Replacement Techniques) is also provided in all committed programs. Based on Aggressive ReplacementTraining (ART®), START is an evidence-based cognitive behavioral program.

Trauma Informed Care (TIC): TIC has been implemented in DJS committed programs since March 2017. The National Association for the States of Mental Health Program Directors (NASMHPD) trained all DJS committed program staff in a TIC model that was originally developed for the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), a nationally recognized leader in Trauma Informed Care. TIC teaches staff to recognize the signs and symptoms of trauma, as well as common reactions to trauma. It also teaches staff about the impact of trauma on the developing brain, and how it impacts the behaviors, reactions, and lives of youth. Through training with the NASMHPD trauma trainers, DJS staff have developed and implemented specific strategies to help youth address

their reactions to trauma triggers, and programs have developed more trauma-informed environments.

Substance Abuse Services: All DJS committed programs offer Seven Challenges substance abuse treatment, an evidence-based program implemented in 2009. Seven Challenges adopts a decision-making model, encouraging youth to make well-informed decisions by weighing the costs (e.g., physical, psychological, and social harm) and benefits of drug use. All programs provide substance abuse services to youth at the needed American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) level ranging from early intervention to clinically managed medium intensity residential services. DJS is in the process of seeking accreditation through the Council on Accreditation (COA) for all the committed programs.

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS):

Implemented in all committed, DJS-operated programs (see table on page 149) since January 2018, PBIS is an evidence-based framework that is designed to facilitate the development of pro-social youth behavior and maintain safety and security in committed programs. For DJS, the PBIS framework includes a behavior modification program, STARR, which is grounded in the principles of positive reinforcement and modeling. The STARR program helps youth learn problem-solving and leadership skills, as well as accept responsibility for their behavior. Program staff are trained to teach and model problem-solving and social skills.

SOMATIC HEALTH

The Somatic Health Services Unit provides comprehensive, quality health care and nutritional services to youth at DJS residential programs. Its mission is to protect, promote, and advance the health of all youth in the care of the Department.

Medical, dental, optometry, and dietary services are provided in an interdisciplinary fashion that is developmentally appropriate for youth.

These services are delivered in accordance with standards set forth by the National Commission on Correctional Health Care, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Centers for Disease Control, and the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Academy of Sciences.

Youth admitted to DJS residential programs require ongoing, routine preventative health care similar to other children their age. In some cases, youth may have unmet or chronic health care needs upon admission, or may develop an acute health condition that needs to be addressed. DJS ensures that each program has licensed nurses, physicians, dieticians, dental providers, laboratory and pharmacy services to meet the health care needs

of the youth. For specialty, surgical, emergency, or in-patient care that may be required, youth are transported to community providers as needed.

Each youth must have a current nursing assessment, history and physical examination, vision screening, and dental screening upon admission or soon thereafter. Youth are also screened for tuberculosis, anemia, and sexually transmitted infections. Girls are provided comprehensive gynecological care either on-site or in the community in order to meet individual needs.

Vaccine records are requested on all youth, and DJS makes every effort to fully immunize youth who are not up to date on recommended and required vaccinations. DJS participates in the Federal Vaccines for Children Program.

Youth are seen at regularly scheduled clinic times and as needed for "sick call" requests. In addition, they are seen at least monthly by nursing staff to check on their overall health status and weight.

EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

Educational services are provided to youth by the Maryland State Department of Education, Juvenile Services Education System (JSES). JSES provides youth in all of the department's residential programs with the ability to earn a high school diploma via the earning of credits or passage of the GED. In addition to academics, the educational programs provide opportunities for each youth to develop career and technology skills that will further assist them when they transition back to the community.

The JSES curriculum is based on the Maryland State College and Career Readiness Standards (CCRS). The curriculum includes grade-level instruction in English, Social Studies, Mathematics, and Science. Middle school coursework and remediation for high school students are also offered in reading, written language, and math as appropriate.

Youth who have a current Individualized Education Program (IEP) are provided with the required services listed in their IEP. Additionally, eligible youth participate in the mandated Maryland Comprehensive Assessment Program (MCAP).

DJS Youth Centers - Career & Technology and the Garrett College Programs

The DJS Youth Centers offer on-site Career and Technology programming to all participants. The two primary goals of this programming are high school completion and job skill development. Certificates are awarded for successful completion of the program, signifying employment competency in fields such as HVAC, plumbing, and commercial food preparation/sanitation. In addition, all youth have opportunities to participate in community projects that employ their acquired skills.

Backbone Mountain Youth Center and Mountain View at Backbone also offer an innovative program that provides youth with the unique opportunity to be simultaneously enrolled in high school classes and introductory college courses through Garrett College of Maryland. Youth are screened through a referral, record review, and interview process for acceptance into the program. The Garrett College initiative has been operational at Backbone Mountain since September 2006.

CLASSIFICATION

All DJS-operated committed programs utilize the Housing Classification Assessment, an objective internal classification system to assess a youth's potential vulnerability and supervision needs (see Appendix G). The results of the classification assessment are used to guide appropriate housing decisions and room assignments. The classification assessment is implemented for all youth upon admission to the program, and it allows for reclassification in response to circumstances or special needs that may require modification of housing or room assignment. All DJS committed programs have been audited by the Department of Justice and found to be fully compliant with juvenile facility standards.

RE-ENTRY PROCESS

DJS recognizes the importance of effectively transitioning youth from placement back to the community. Youth who are released from commitment face a number of challenges in returning to daily life such as re-enrolling in school or accessing needed somatic or behavioral health services. DJS has implemented focused efforts to assist with this transition as part of a re-entry strategic plan.



Youth from the Woodshop Program have an opportunity to create tables and pictures using wood, canvas, paint, and epoxy.



The re-entry process is managed by a team of regional re-entry specialists; under the direction of the Executive Director of Community Supervision, the specialists oversee each youth's return to the community. A re-entry staffing, similar to MAST, is held 45 days prior to release during which the youth's housing plan, educational/occupational needs, ongoing behavioral/somatic health service requirements, and family relationships are reviewed. A re-entry checklist guides and captures the results of this process. Families of committed youth are invited and encouraged to participate in the re-entry planning process, which is a key area for family engagement.

After the youth has been in the community for 30 days, a DJS re-entry specialist follows up to ensure that the youth has accessed all needed services, has successfully re-enrolled in their local public school when appropriate, and has remained in stable and suitable housing. 
A Note to Readers

Placement versus Admission: A placement is based on a decision made by the Department or a judge to place a youth into a committed program. An admission occurs when a youth physically enters a program either through direct placement or through transfer. Therefore, during one placement, a youth may have several admissions, and these counts will not match.

Average Length of Stay (ALOS) Data: is based on all releases: successful, unsuccessful, and transfers.

DJS State-Operated Committed Programs by Region





The juvenile court may commit a youth to the care and custody of DJS, thereby transferring legal custody to the Department. A range of out-of-home program options have been developed for committed youth. Community-based program options include placement in a foster home, group home, or independent living program. Placements in non-community settings include Residential Treatment Centers (RTCs), DJS-operated Youth Centers, and secure confinement programs. DJS operated seven committed programs in Maryland during FY 2020. DJS also contracts with other programs both in state and out of state.

Note: Community-Based Family Therapy Programs are presented within this section (pages 188-189) because one of their primary goals is to divert youth from out-of-home committed placement. These data are not included on the statewide tables, which only include youth in committed out-of-home placements.





Statewide Females Only

Female youth represented approximately 14% of the population of youth committed to the care and custody of the Department during FY 2020. DJS offers the same continuum of placement options to both girls and boys, with the exception of a hardware-secure program. Community-based program options include placement in a foster home, group home, or independent living program. During FY 2020, placements in non-community settings include Residential Treatment Centers (RTC) and the J. DeWeese Carter Center, a hardware secure, DJS-operated committed program for girls. This program was closed June 30, 2020, and the population was moved to Mountain View, a new staff secure female-only program on the grounds of Backbone Mountain Youth Center. Out-of-state contracted programs are also available.





Statewide Under Age 13 Only

Although juvenile court jurisdiction includes youth ages 7-17, youth under age 13 are rarely committed to an out-of-home placement. Because of the needs of youth under age 13, they are most frequently placed in residential treatment centers, group homes, or therapeutic group homes. State-owned and operated committed programs are designed for youth ages 13 years and older. Wherever placed, youth under age 13 receive the same services that other committed youth receive.







Foster Care

Traditional Foster Care is continuous 24-hour care with supportive services provided to a youth in a DJS-approved family home. The foster family serves low-risk youth who cannot be managed in their own homes. Youth served may be experiencing behavioral problems and need a respite from family/neighborhood issues. Foster Care also serves youth who need long-term placement, primarily because it may not be appropriate for youth to return home. Treatment Foster Care (TFC) is continuous 24-hour care with intensive support services operated by a licensed child placement agency or local Department of Social Services (DSS) in a family setting for children with serious emotional, behavioral, medical, and/or psychological conditions. The behaviors of the youth served are not so severe that removal from the community is necessary.





Group Homes

General group homes are non-profit residential programs for youth in placements licensed by DHS, DJS, or the Office of Health Care Quality (OHCQ), which is part of the Maryland Department of Health (MDH). They provide out-of-home care for four or more youth who are moderate to high risk and need more structure and supervision than a relative, foster parent, or treatment foster care program could offer. General group homes also provide a formal program of basic care, social work, and health care services. Therapeutic group homes (TGH) are residential programs for youth in out-of-home care that are licensed by OHCQ, and must be non-profit organizations. TGHs provide access to a range of diagnostic and therapeutic mental health services to youth who are moderate to high risk and have an emotional or developmental disability. Those TGHs that provide educational programs on their grounds are considered to be staff secure programs.





Independent Living Programs (Including Alternative Living Units)

Independent Living Programs are operated by DHS-licensed child placement agencies for youth 15 to 21 years of age who need to become self-sufficient and learn responsible living skills, as they are unlikely to return home. Youth reside in either group homes or supervised apartment units and must be enrolled in high school, college, vocational training, or be gainfully employed. During the program, youth learn about interpersonal skills, money management, job readiness, conflict management, positive leisure opportunities, and communication skills. Alternative Living Units are residences owned, leased, or operated by a licensee that: (a) provides residential services for children who, because of a developmental disability, require specialized living arrangements; (b) admits not more than three children; and (c) provides 24-hour care.





Residential Treatment Centers (Includes Psychiatric Hospitals & Diagnostic Units/Clinical Evaluation Units)

Residential Treatment Centers (RTCs) provide intensive psychiatric and psychological treatment services. These centers are required to have psychiatrists, psychologists, and psychiatric nurses on staff to lead treatment. Maryland RTCs are approved for operation through the State Certificate of Need (CON) process and are licensed through the Office of Health Care Quality (OHCQ). Some RTCs concentrate on specific youth populations. For example, some staff secure and hardware secure RTCs focus on youth with behavioral problems and/or considered to be potentially harmful to self or others. The RTCs are intended to stabilize the youth's emotional condition, to provide services that increase the youth's ability to manage his/her mental illness as a potentially life-long challenge, to help the youth develop social skills for coping with both daily or difficult situations and interpersonal relationships, and to transition the youth to a less restrictive environment or home.





Out-of-State (OOS) Programs

Maryland law prohibits an out-of-state placement for youth unless a court finds the youth's individualized needs cannot be met through instate resources. Additionally, DJS policy states that youth may not be placed out of state without the approval of the Secretary or designee. The Department adheres to Interstate Compact requirements and agreements with other states regarding requests for permission and notification when youth are placed in another state. Youth placed in out-of-state programs are visited by DJS staff at least quarterly, and parents/guardians are provided with opportunities to visit youth at least once per quarter. OOS programs are licensed by local authorities and not by Maryland agencies. DJS contracts with vendors to provide services in two broad categories: (1) RTC-level specialized mental health services and (2) staff- and hardware-secure programming.







This Youth Center opened in 1966 as a forestry camp on Backbone Mountain in Garrett County with funds appropriated by the General Assembly and became a youth center in 1977. Programs include the Seven Challenges drug treatment program and STARR, DJS' behavioral modification program. Youth receive a Substance Use Assessment, and a level of care is determined. Backbone is certified to offer Substance Abuse Early Intervention, Outpatient, and Intensive Outpatient Services. Drug treatment focuses on clinically managed low-intensity residential substance abuse treatment services. Youth participate in individual and group interventions. Family counseling is offered to every youth, and psychiatric services are available to all youth. Youth participate in TAMAR-Y, a trauma-focused psychoeducation program, as well as START, an evidence-based cognitive behavioral group intervention focused on developing youth's social skills, anger control, and moral reasoning. Regular family interaction is encouraged with visits, phone calls, family days, and family counseling. MSDE provides educational services on a 12-month schedule, with six hours of daily instruction five days a week in English, mathematics, science, social studies, health, and life skills. MSDE also offers OSHA and ServSafe Certification, and individualized programs to prepare youth for the GED exam. The College Program is offered in conjunction with Garrett College of Maryland. Youth are screened for acceptance into the program. Selected youth are admitted for one college semester while in DJS' care and earn a MD High School Diploma, as well as up to 15 college credits.







The success of the first forestry camp for boys at Green Ridge prompted the General Assembly to appropriate funds for additional facilities in 1956 (Chapter 98, Acts of 1956). The Camp was renamed Savage Mountain Youth Center in 1977. Programming includes STARR (DJS' behavioral modification program), Seven Challenges (evidence-based drug treatment), START (evidence-based cognitive behavioral group intervention focused on developing youth's social skills, anger control, and moral reasoning), and TAMAR-Y (group intervention to address trauma issues). Behavioral Health staff provide individual, group, and family counseling services. Substance abuse treatment is offered on a continuum from early intervention to clinically managed medium intensity, as appropriate for the individual participant. Family engagement in treatment planning is encouraged. Regular family interaction is encouraged through family visits, phone calls, special family day activities at the facility, and home visits to help youth successfully transition back to the community. While individual cases are assessed on a case-by-case basis, typical placements involve participants who present a high risk of AWOL/escape, demonstrate high aggression, have high mental health needs, have had a previous mental health placement, have an intense substance abuse disorder, or display developmental or maturity factors that are considered best served by a hardware secure placement. MSDE provides educational services on a 12-month schedule, with six hours of daily instruction five days a week.







Mountain Quest is a 90-day program for committed males ages 13-18 located at Green Ridge Youth Center. Mountain Quest is a first-time commitment program that provides youth time away from their families and communities, giving them the opportunity to change their behavior while learning to take responsibility for their actions. The Mountain Quest program gives youth the opportunity to work on thought patterns and behaviors that will help them be more successful when they return to the community. Family work and interventions are critical at this time to better assess needs and provide an open line of communication.

The program offers individual and group behavioral health interventions, drug education, and telepsychiatry services. Youth participate in TAMAR-Y, a trauma-focused psychoeducation program, as well as START, an evidence-based cognitive behavioral group intervention focused on developing youth's social skills, anger control, and moral reasoning. Regular family interaction is encouraged with visits, phone calls, family days, and family counseling. MSDE provides educational services on a 12-month schedule, with six hours of daily instruction five days a week in English, mathematics, science, social studies, health, and life skills. Additionally, MSDE offers individualized programs to prepare youth for the GED exam.







Programming includes the Seven Challenges drug treatment program and STARR, DJS' behavioral modification program. Youth receive a Substance Use Assessment, and a level of care is determined. Green Ridge Youth Center is certified to offer Substance Abuse Early Intervention, Outpatient, and Intensive Outpatient Services. Drug treatment focuses on clinically managed low-intensity residential substance abuse treatment services. Youth participate in individual and group interventions. Family counseling is offered to every youth, and psychiatric services are also available to all. Youth participate in TAMAR-Y, a traumafocused psychoeducation program, as well as START, an evidence-based cognitive behavioral group intervention focused on developing youth's social skills, anger control, and moral reasoning. Regular family interaction is encouraged with visits, phone calls, family days, and family counseling. MSDE provides educational services on a 12-month schedule, with six hours of daily instruction five days a week in English, mathematics, science, social studies, health and life skills. Additionally, MSDE offers OSHA Certification and individualized programs to prepare youth for the GED exam.







J. DeWeese Carter Center opened as a secure residential program in November 2011 to serve females ages 14-18 who were committed to DJS. The Center provided gender-responsive, trauma-informed programming and treatment services. In addition, the Center implemented STARR, a behavioral modification program that establishes structure for an environment of respect and fairness conducive to treatment and rehabilitation. MSDE provided academic and vocational services. The school provided a 12-month schedule that included six hours of daily instruction five days a week in English, mathematics, science, social studies, health, life skills, as well as individualized GED programs that prepared youth for successful completion of a high school diploma examination.

This program was closed June 30, 2020, and the population was moved to Mountain View on June 19, 2020. Mountain View is a new staff secure female-only program on the grounds of Backbone Mountain Youth Center with a capacity of 6 females.







Meadow Mountain Youth Center opened as a forestry camp for boys in 1958 and reopened in 1984 as an intensive outpatient program providing youth with at least nine hours of drug treatment weekly, which included Seven Challenges group therapy. Additionally, Meadow Mountain used STARR, DJS' behavioral modification program, and housed the Reflections Program, which included a high and low ropes challenge course, an aquatic challenge, and different outdoor activities. MSDE provided educational services on a 12-month schedule, with six hours of daily instruction five days a week in English, mathematics, science, social studies, health, and life skills.

This program was closed June 30, 2020, and the population was moved to Green Ridge Youth Center.







The Victor Cullen Center (VCC) was originally a sanatorium for tuberculosis patients named after the physician in charge of the institution, Dr. Victor F. Cullen. In July 2007, VCC reopened under state administration as a regional committed treatment center. VCC is a hardware secure program for males, primarily serving youth ages 15-21 in a six-month to nine-month treatment program for mental health and/or substance abuse issues. Programming includes the Seven Challenges drug treatment program and STARR, DJS' behavioral modification program. Youth receive individual and group substance abuse interventions. All youth participate in TAMAR-Y, a trauma-focused psychoeducation program, as well as START, an evidence-based cognitive behavioral group intervention focused on developing youth's social skills, anger control, and moral reasoning. In addition, individual counseling is provided to all youth, and family counseling and psychiatric services are available to all youth. Regular family interaction is encouraged through visits, phone calls, family counseling, and family day activities. Recreational programming includes camping and intramural sports competitions. Specialized programs include Yoga and Mindfulness Training and arts-based programs. MSDE provides educational services on a 12-month schedule, with six hours of daily instruction five days a week in English, mathematics, science, social studies, health, and life skills. Additionally, MSDE offers individualized programs to prepare youth for the GED exam.







Silver Oak Academy (SOA) is a private residential program owned and operated by Rite of Passage, Inc. SOA is an achievement-based program designed to highlight and develop positive pro-social skills and activities to assist youth in transitioning to the community and being successful. Youth have individualized treatment plans with measured goals that include learning social skills, gaining academic knowledge, vocational-technical competence, independent life skills and family engagement. SOA serves youth ages 14-18. Vocational training services include the following: food service and hospitality management, carpentry/electrical, construction/masonry, cosmetology/ barbering, and electronics. SOA has a large campus that includes a year-round high school approved by MSDE, a competition gym (with wrestling and weight rooms), outdoor competition fields, and a running track. During FY 2014, the DJS contracted capacity at SOA increased from 48 to 96.





Community-Based Family Therapy Programs

DJS uses research-supported, community-based family therapy programs to address the needs of youth, and to reduce further system involvement and out-of-home placements. Evidence-Based Services (EBS) constitute those designated as "model" programs by Blueprints for Healthy Youth Development (Center for the Study and Prevention of Violence at the University of Colorado Boulder) and currently include Functional Family Therapy (FFT) and Multisystemic Therapy (MST). These services are family-based therapeutic models shown to be effective with youth involved with the juvenile justice system. In addition, Family Centered Treatment (FCT), provided by the Institute for Family Centered Services, Inc., is a family preservation model of in-home treatment, which helps families to learn and adopt positive behavioral patterns.





Measuring Recidivism Rates*

Measuring recidivism for DJS youth is a vital tool for understanding the effectiveness of interventions aimed at reducing future system involvement and for measuring the ultimate public safety impact of services provided. Though other outcomes are also important to study, including future educational attainment, employment, and other non-offense-related outcomes, recidivism remains the primary measure of success. DJS therefore conducts an annual recidivism study and publishes comprehensive recidivism reports as part of the Data Resource Guide. It is important to note that recidivism is not only a measure of the effectiveness of the program/services provided, but it also depends on the quality of re-entry planning, aftercare supervision, availability and quality of supports in the community and/or family to which youth return, local economic opportunities, and other factors. It is also important to account for the assessed risk levels of youth served when analyzing success. All youth assigned to probation or placed in an out-of-home committed program are assessed for risk of future reoffending using the validated MCASP needs assessment. The assessed risk level guides decisions about the level of supervision and intensity of treatment services required for an individual youth. MCASP identifies factors that have been shown to predict future reoffending, such as prior delinquency and criminogenic risk factors related to school, family, substance use, peers, etc. Programs that serve higher-risk youth might expect to see higher recidivism rates than those serving lower-risk youth. Studies have also shown that services designed for higher-risk youth may not be effective, or even prove detrimental if provided to lower-risk youth. For these reasons, these reports include a breakdown of the levels of risk of the recidivism study cohorts.

RECIDIVISM DEFINITION

The juvenile justice community has not reached a consensus on how best to define recidivism with a single measure, so DJS captures and reports several measures. Because youth may age out of juvenile court jurisdiction during the recidivism follow-up period, DJS includes information from the adult criminal justice system. Since many charges are not ultimately sustained by the juvenile court, or found guilty in an adult court, DJS measures not only new arrests, but also resulting juvenile court adjudications or adult convictions, and new juvenile out-of-home commitments or adult incarcerations. Maryland tracks new arrests for up to three years, but publishes rearrest rates after a one-year follow up period, and reconviction and reincarceration with a two-year lag, to account for often lengthy court processing times. For purposes of these recidivism studies, a new arrest includes any new delinquent or criminal felony/misdemeanor offense. Not counted are status offenses, traffic citations, violations of local ordinances, and technical violations of probation which do not include a new delinquent or criminal offense. Only those new adjudications, convictions, commitments, and incarcerations that are the result of a new arrest are included, not those stemming from offenses prior to the probation or commitment episode. All recidivism rates are calculated at the youth level, rather than the case level. Youth who recidivate in both juvenile and adult systems are counted only once by the first offense or arrest date during the follow-up period. It is, however, possible for a youth to appear in both the probation and committed study cohorts.

Post-Commitment Recidivism

Youth released from committed out-of-home placements are a primary focus for measuring recidivism. These data include youth who had been committed to DJS by the Maryland juvenile court for placement in an out-of-home committed program (whether within Maryland or out of state) and who were released within the study year. Youth from outside Maryland are included if they have been committed by a Maryland court. Committed programs ranging from foster placements to programs involving secure confinement are included, and programs may be operated by DJS, or provide services under contract. New offenses that occur on the same day of commitment release while youth are in a committed program are not counted as recidivism. Results are shown by year of new offense, level of recidivism, demographics, county, risk level, program type, and by individual program. In cases where a youth had been served by multiple programs during a commitment spell, transfers are not considered as a release, and rates are attributed to the program representing the final release.

PROBATION RECIDIVISM

This cohort includes all youth with a new juvenile probation disposition during the year. Recidivism events are tracked from the disposition date for up to three years, regardless of how long a youth remains under supervision. Results are shown by year of new offense, level of recidivism, demographics, region, county, and risk level.

For purposes of this *Data Resource Guide*, rates will be combined for the juvenile and adult system into three overall categories using juvenile and/or criminal justice recidivism measures and labeled as:

1. Rearrest 2. Reconviction 3. Reincarceration

DATA SOURCES

Information from two different databases (juvenile and adult) is retrieved, processed, and compiled for each of the selected released cohorts. Data gathering involves the following procedures:

- A list of all youth with a probation disposition, or released from DJS committed residential programs is obtained from the Department's ASSIST management information system.
- Master cohort files are created containing gender, race, date of birth, county of jurisdiction, region of jurisdiction, county of residence, and region of residence. For committed youth, the last program name and program type from which youth was released during the release cohort is also included. Risk level is added using the full MCASP assessment completed or updated closest and prior to the committed release date for committed youth, and closest to the disposition date for probation youth.
- For both committed and probation cohort files, juvenile recidivism events are added from the ASSIST database, including subsequent
 arrests, adjudications, and commitments. Dates of offense are used to code recidivism events as occurring one, two, and three years
 after release.
- Adult arrest and court disposition information is obtained from the Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS), using DJS youth
 name, date of birth, race, and gender as identification or index fields. These records are added to a text file and returned to DJS
 with the response data. Name match is as follows: Smith, Gregory will match with Smith, Gregory and Smith Greg. Smith, Greg
 will match with Smith, Greg and Smith, Gr, but not with Smith, Gregory. DJS youth names are given in full and checked for any
 abbreviation as Gr or Greg for example.
- Youth who recidivate in both systems are counted only once by the first offense or arrest date during the follow-up period.

12-Month Juvenile and/or Criminal Justice Recidivism Rates for FY 2017-2019 Releases, BY Region and County




COMMITTED PROGRAM RELEASES BY RISK LEVEL*, FY 2014-2018 RELEASES






PROBATION YOUTH BY RISK LEVEL¹, FY 2014-2018[^]



Appendix E

DJS has changed the way it reports daily costs for facility operations. The method used in DRGs prior to FY 2019 reported cost based on a simple per-diem rate calculation. This was determined to misrepresent the actual daily operations cost. Facility populations fluctuate daily, and it costs the same to staff, heat, and maintain a 12-bed unit, whether it houses 7 youth or 12 youth on a given night. The new method uses the bed capacity to calculate the daily rate: Total annual expenditures (not including education costs budgeted to MSDE)/366 days (leap year)/Number of beds.

ACCOUNTABILITY INCENTIVES MANAGEMENT (AIM)

AIM grids are designed to structure case manager decision-making when responding to positive or negative behaviors of supervised youth. The Graduated Responses grid determines an appropriate response based on the level of infraction and the level of youth supervision. Responses range from a verbal warning at the lowest level, to requesting a formal violation at the highest. This structured process supports the Department's efforts to reward positive behaviors and objectively identify and sanction violations, which reduce inequalities and increasessuccessful completion rates among supervised youth.

Racial and ethnic disparities are created and perpetuated over time for a number of reasons, including personal and interpersonal biases, longstanding and divisive cultural factors, and institutional racism (e.g., routine, often invisible, systemic production of inequitable social opportunities and outcomes by race and ethnicity). The Racial Impact Assessment Lens (RIAL) is an examination tool used by DJS managers and staff to anticipate, assess, and prevent adverse consequences for youth and families of color as a result of agency policy, practice, and programs.

This tool is also used to guide agency leaders in the identification and adoption of measures that advance specific benefits and outcomes for racial and ethnic groups to eliminate disparate treatment and outcomes. While the juvenile justice system is comprised of multiple public agencies with statutorily-mandated decision making, DJS utilizes this tool to maximize its public accountability to ensure equitable decisions and outcomes for youth and families of color that it serves.

Note: "Proposed action" is the development, implementation or modification of an existing agency policy, set of protocols, or program to serve DJS youth and families.

The DJS Office of Equity & Reform leads use of this tool and staff training to periodically review agency policy, practice, and programs as a part of the DJS Race Equity and Inclusion (REI) Framework.



Appendix K

CRIMES OF VIOLENCE

The definition of "crimes of violence" occurs in two separate places in Maryland's Annotated Code. The Maryland State Commission on Criminal Sentencing Policy uses the definition found in the Maryland Annotated Code, Correctional Services Article, Section 7-101(m). This definition, which is used here, references section 14-101 of the Criminal Law Article and also includes burglary in the 1st, 2nd, or 3rd degree.

Maryland Annotated Code, Criminal Law Article, Section 14-101 provides a list of crimes identified as crimes of violence. They are as follows:

- (1) abduction; (2) arson in the first degree; (3) kidnapping; (4) manslaughter, except involuntary manslaughter; (5) mayhem; (6) maiming, as previously proscribed under former Article 27, §§385 and 386 of the Annotated Code; (7) murder; (8) rape; (9) robbery under §3-402 or §3-403 of the Criminal Law Article; (10) carjacking; (11) armed carjacking; (12) sexual offense in the first degree; (13) sexual offense in the second degree; (14) use of a handgun in the commission of a felony or other crime of violence; (15) child abuse in the first degree under §3-601 of the Criminal Law Article; (16) sexual abuse of a minor under §3-602 of the Criminal Law Article if:
 - (i) the victim is under the age of 13 years and the offender is an adult at the time of the offense; and
 - (ii) the offense involved:
 - 1. vaginal intercourse, as defined in §3-301 of the Criminal Law Article;
 - 2. a sexual act, as defined in §3-301 of the Criminal Law Article;
 - 3. an act in which a part of the offender's body penetrates, however slightly, into the victim's genital opening or anus; or
 - 4. the intentional touching, not through the clothing, of the victim's or the offender's genital, anal, or other intimate area for sexual arousal, gratification, or abuse;

(17) home invasion under § 6-202(b) of the Criminal Law Article; (18) an attempt to commit any of the crimes described in items (1) through (16) above; (19) continuing course of conduct with a child under §3-315 of the Criminal Law Article; (20) assault in the first degree; (21) assault with intent to murder; (22) assault with intent to rape; (23) assault with intent to rob; (24) assault with intent to commit a sexual offense in the first degree; and (25) assault with intent to commit a sexual offense in the second degree.

- Title 9 Juvenile Services
 - Establishes the functions of the Department of Juvenile Services; enumerates the authority of the Secretary; details the organization and administration of DJS; establishes the operation of state facilities, advisory boards, juvenile care facilities, and regional services; and specifies the procedures for Interstate Compact and the Juvenile Services facility capital program.

Courts and Judicial Proceedings Article

- Title 3 Courts of General Jurisdiction
 - Establishes the jurisdiction and functions of the juvenile court.
- Subtitle 8 Juvenile Causes Children in Need of Assistance (CINA)
 - §3-823. Permanency plan for out-of-home placement: Requires the court to hold a permanency planning hearing to determine the permanency plan for a child no later than 11 months after a child is committed.
- Subtitle 8A Juvenile Causes Children Other than CINAs and Adults
 - §3-8A-01. Definitions: Provides the meanings of words commonly used in juvenile justice (e.g. adjudicatory hearing, community detention, detention, disposition, petition, violation.)
 - §3-8A-02. Purposes and construction of subtitle: Establishes the goals of the Juvenile Justice System.
 - §3-8A-03. Jurisdiction of court: Specifies the jurisdiction of the court over delinquent, child in need of supervision (CINS), Peace Order, and Interstate Compact juveniles and details exceptions to this jurisdiction.
 - §3-8A-05. Determination of Jurisdiction: Specifies the age of the person at the time the alleged delinquent act was committed and controls the determination of jurisdiction under this subtitle.

Maryland Citations Pertaining to DJS and Juvenile Jurisdiction

- §3-8A-06. Waiver of jurisdiction: Describes how the juvenile court may waive jurisdiction of a youth to the adult court.
- §3-8A-07. Retention, termination or waiver of jurisdiction: Describes when the court may terminate jurisdiction.
- §3-8A-08. Venue: Establishes the venue for a CINS petition, a petition concerning delinquency, a Peace Order Request, and certain offenses.
- §3-8A-09. Transfer of Proceedings: Describes when the court may transfer certain proceedings to the youth's county of residence or domicile.
- §3-8A-10. Complaint; preliminary procedures: Procedural requirements when an intake office receives a complaint from a person or agency or certain citations issued by a police officer.
- §3-8A-10.1. Child in Need of Supervision Pilot Program: Describes the CINS pilot program.
- §3-8A-12. Certain information inadmissible in subsequent proceedings: Describes when certain statements or information are inadmissible in certain proceedings.
- §3-8A-13. Petition; general procedures: Describes the general procedures for filing a petition that alleges delinquency or CINS and for filing peace order requests.
- §3-8A-14. Taking child into custody: Defines methods by which youth may be taken into custody (e.g. by court order/law enforcement officer.)
- §3-8A-14.1.Taking child into custody-Arrest Warrant: Describes the procedure by which an arrest warrant may be obtained for crimes originating in juvenile jurisdiction.
- §3-8A-15. Detention and shelter care prior to hearing: Provides the authorization for placing a youth in detention, community detention, or shelter care for a child who may be in need of supervision or delinquent.
- §3-8A-16. Transfer to other facilities: Requires notice to be given to the court or DJS Intake by an adult detention facility upon receiving an individual under the age of 18. Also provides for transfer to adult facility when juvenile jurisdiction is waived and prohibits transportation of juveniles with adult inmates unless juvenile is charged as an adult.
- §3-8A-16.1. Blood lead level testing: Authorizes a court to order a child to undergo blood lead level testing after a petition has been filed, but before an adjudication.
- §3-8A-17. Study and Examination of child, etc: Describes when the court may direct DJS or another qualified agency to make a study concerning the child, the child's family, the child's environment, and other matters relating to the disposition of the case.
- §3-8A-17.1 §3-8A-17.12. Juvenile Competency: Procedural requirements regarding juvenile competency, including evaluations, reports, hearings, services, court findings, and dismissal.
- §3-8A-18. Adjudication: Requires the court to hold an adjudicatory hearing; requires the allegations in the petition be proved beyond a reasonable doubt that the youth has committed a delinquent act. Also prescribes situations when application for body attachment can be made.
- §3-8A-19. Disposition; costs: Requires the court to hold a separate disposition hearing after an adjudicatory hearing unless the court has dismissed/waived the petition/citation; allows disposition to be held on the day of the adjudicatory hearing; and describes permitted dispositions.
- §3-8A-19.1 §3-8A-19.5. Peace Order Request: Describes procedures for an intake officer to file a Peace Order Request, peace order hearings, forms of relief the order may include, service of a peace order; modification or recessions, and violations of an order.
- §3-8A-20. Right to counsel: Specifies when a youth is entitled to the assistance of counsel.
- §3-8A-20.1. Treatment service plan: Defines "treatment service plan" and describes the procedures for development and implementation of a treatment service plan.
- §3-8A-21. Emergency medical treatment: Authorizes court to order medical treatment in certain circumstances when child's guardian is unavailable or refuses to grant authorization without good cause.
- §3-8A-22. Limitations on place of commitment: Specifies the limitations on where the court may detain, commit, or transfer a youth.



MARYLAND CITATIONS PERTAINING TO DJS AND JUVENILE JURISDICTION

- §3-8A-23. Effect of proceedings under subtitle: Describes the effect of an adjudication and disposition of a child.
- §3-8A-24. Effective period of order of commitment; renewal of order: Specifies the length of time for an order of commitment, procedures for renewal of an order, and when the order is effective.
- §3-8A-25. Progress reports: Specifies requirements for visitation by a juvenile counselor of a child who is committed to an individual or to a public or private agency or institution. Authorizes the court to require the custodian to file periodic reports.
- §3-8A-26. Order controlling conduct of a person before the court: Authorizes the court to make an appropriate order controlling conduct under certain circumstances.
- §3-8A-27. Confidentiality of records: Describes confidentiality requirements, procedures, and exceptions for police and court records pertaining to or concerning a child.
- §3-8A-27.1. Expungement of records: Describes procedure for expunging juvenile records.
- §3-8A-28. Judgment of restitution: Authorizes the court to enter a judgment of restitution against the parent of a child, the child, or both.
- §3-8A-29. Parents liable for support after commitment: Authorizes the court to order either parent/both parents to pay support of the child.
- §3-8A-30. Contributing to certain conditions of a child: Describes the offense of contributing to certain conditions of a child and provides for a penalty.
- §3-8A-32. Appointment of attorney or advocate to represent child's interest: Authorizes a court to appoint an attorney to represent a child's interest under certain conditions.
- §3-8A-33. Citation for certain violations: Authorizes a law enforcement officer to issue a citation to a child if the officer has probable cause to believe that the child is violating certain alcoholic beverage, tobacco, salvia divinorum, or marijuana possession violations.
- §3-8A-34. Rights of victim or witness of delinquent act: Refers to the rights of victims and witnesses of delinquent acts.

Appendix O RELATIVE RATE INDEX (RRI)

The Relative Rate Index (RRI) is a measure of Disproportionate Minority Contact (DMC) with the juvenile justice system. It is a standardized tool for measuring how ethnic minorities compare with white youth at various contact points (court referral, diversion, etc.). The RRI was developed by the National Center for Juvenile Justice, with funding from the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP), Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice.

DEFINITIONS FOR KEY CONTACT POINTS

The definitions below describe each key contact point included in the tables that follow, along with a brief explanation of each point. Understanding each contact point and how it is defined in the calculations will provide the basis for proper interpretation of the rates. Though not a 'contact point,' the general youth population is included because it is a key data point for calculating the rate of contact.

Contact Point	Definition
Population	Population of youth ages 11-17 as of July 2019. Source: MD Dept. of Planning. Note: DJS uses 11-17 as a population denominator due to the low number of cases under 11.
Referrals to Juvenile Court/Intake	Juvenile complaints referred to DJS intake, from police or other sources, including delinquent & non-delinquent offenses, recorded in ASSIST. Rate is based on youth in the general population.
Diversion	Complaints diverted by DJS Intake (resolved or informally adjusted to pre-court supervision) without formal petition. Rate is per referral.
Detention	Cases resulting in detention both pre-disposition or pending placement, but not including youth ejected to detention from a committed placement. Rate is per referral.
Petitioned	Complaints resulting in juvenile court petitions. Rate is per referral.
Delinquent	Complaints resulting in delinquent findings. Rate is per petition.
Probation	Probation dispositions. Rate is per delinquent finding.
Confinement	Youth placed in a hardware secure state-operated committed program; or staff- and hardware-secure private out-of-state programs. Rate is per delinquent finding.
Transferred	Juvenile petitions waived up to adult court. Does not include charges under original adult jurisdiction. Rate is per petition.

RRI TABLE FOR ALL MINORITY YOUTH

The data presented here show the RRI for minority youth compared to white youth. An RRI of 1.0 indicates no disproportional contact. A rate higher than 1.0 indicates that minority youth are disproportionately over-represented at that decision point, and a rate below 1.0 shows they are under-represented. The RRI for each decision point is based on the number of youth of each race/ethnicity represented at that point compared with the number at the previous decision point.

RATES OF CONTACT FOR ALL YOUTH

This table shows the number and rate of representation for all youth, regardless of color, at each key juvenile justice decision point. The rates are based on the general population for this table, rather than based on the previous decision point.


Secure Detention Information


