#### **ENTRANCE CONFERENCE:**

On November 19, 2024, an Entrance Conference was conducted by Landon Saunders, QA Specialist. The QA Specialist discussed the audit process and addressed any concerns and questions.

#### **REVIEW PROCESS:**

- The school was notified 10 business days prior to the actual start of the audit. This timeframe allowed the school to gather the student files and collect requested information.
- Audited the records and information for all students enrolled in the school from July 1, 2024 until November 8, 2024.

#### **EXIT CONFERENCE:**
