



Maryland Juvenile Complaints Have Declined Significantly


Complaints referred to DJS Intake declined 59.4% over ten years.

The Percent of Cases Referred to Juvenile Court by DJS Intake has Declined Over the Past Four Years


- 45.0% of complaints were referred to court by DJS in FY 2018, up from 41.9% in FY 2009, but down from the 53.5% referred in FY 2014.
- In FY 2018 15.2% of complaints were diverted to an informal (pre-court) DJS case, and 39.8% were resolved or determined to have no jurisdiction.

Maryland Juvenile Detention Population Declined Significantly


- The average daily population in DJS detention declined 27.6% over ten years.
- Pre-Disposition ADP declined 54.5% in ten years to 125.2 youth in FY 2018.
- Pending Placement population declined 55.9% in ten years to 61.2 youth in FY 2018.
- Cases detained for the Adult Court now make up 37.7% of the DJS detained population.

Maryland Juvenile Detention Population Declined Significantly


Pre-Disposition Juvenile Court ADP declined 54.5% in ten years to 125.2 youth in FY 2018.

Youth In Detention Pending a Committed Placement Has Declined Significantly

• Juvenile Court Pending Placement population declined 55.9% in ten years to 61.2 youth in FY 2018, and is down 69.1% from its peak of 198.3 in FY 2011.



Maryland Juvenile Pre-Disposition Detention Placements Have Decreased for All Complaint Types

- Youth detained for misdemeanors has decreased 67.4% over ten years.
- Youth detained pending disposition for crimes of violence has decreased 51.3% over ten years.



Crimes of Violence Make Up an Increasing Percent of Detention Placement Offenses

 Youth detained pre-disposition for Crimes of Violence now make up almost a third of detention placements (31%), which is up from 22% in FY 2009.


Proportion of Pre-D Detention Admissions For Crimes of Violence, FY09 - FY18

Detention Placements for Non-Violent Felonies are Declining


- The percent of youth detained pre-disposition for Non-Violent Felony complaints has decreased 7 percentage points over 10 years.
- The detained population is increasingly comprised of youth with violent crime complaints.

Statewide Pre-D Detention Placements


- Youth detained pre-disposition for Crimes of Violence increased 9 percentage points over 10 years.
- Pre-disposition for non-violent felonies decreased 7 percentage points over

Juvenile Probation and Commitment Orders Have Declined


- Maryland juvenile probation orders declined 58.6% in ten years.
- Juvenile commitments declined 52.8% in ten years.

The Rate of Juveniles Committed for Low-Level Offenses Has Declined


- The proportion of new commitments for misdemeanor and other low-level offenses declined 9 percentage points over 10 years.
- The proportion of new commitments for crimes of violence has increased 13 percentage points over ten years.

The Rate of Juveniles Committed for Crimes of Violence Has Increased


- Crimes of Violence make up more than a quarter of new commitments in FY 2018.
- The rate of juveniles committed for Non-Violent Felonies has remained flat in recent years.


The Rate of Juveniles Committed for Crimes of Violence Has Increased

• Crimes of Violence make up more than a quarter of new commitments in FY 2018.




The Rate of Juveniles Committed for Non-Violent Felonies Has Remained Flat in Recent Years

Non-violent felonies decreased 6 percentage points over ten years.




The Rate of Juveniles Committed for Violations of Probation Has Decreased

• The rate of new commitments for violations increased 2.1 percentage points in 10 years to 22.2% in FY 2018, but has decreased 8.2 points from its peak of 30.4% in FY 2015.



Committed Youth Population Has Declined Sharply

- The total average daily population (ADP) of Maryland youth committed by the juvenile court to out-of-home placement declined 55.5% over ten years, from 925.0 in FY 2009 to 411.5 in FY 2018.
- From FY 2014 to FY 2018, the committed ADP dropped 54.2%, from 898.1 to 411.5.



Committed Recidivism Has Declined In Recent Years

- Since FY 2010, the rate of youth released from all committed programs who got a new juvenile adjudication or adult conviction within one year increased 3.0 percentage points, from 20.0% to 23.0% in FY 2016.
- DJS intends to cut the FY 2014 rate in half in five years, from 20.9% to 10.5% by FY 2019.


One-Year Re-Adjudication/Conviction Rate for All Committed Programs*

All Measures of Committed Recidivism Have Declined In Recent Years

- Since FY 2010, the rate of new arrests (juvenile or adult) one year from release declined 6.2 percentage points.
- New resulting convictions declined 3.0 percentage points.
- New resulting commitment or incarceration declined 2.9 points.



Recidivism For DJS Committed Facilities Has Declined Significantly In Recent Years

 Since FY 2010, the rate of youth released from DJS committed facilities who got a new juvenile adjudication or adult conviction within one year dropped 4.8 percentage points, from 31.0% to 26.2% in FY 2016.

All Measures of Probation Recidivism Have Declined In Recent Years

- Since FY 2010, the rate of new arrests (juvenile or adult) one year from placement declined 3.4 percentage points.
- New resulting convictions declined 1.8 percentage points.
- New resulting commitment or incarceration declined 1.6 points.
